ANNUAL TOWN MEETING June 3, 2013

A legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of East Bridgewater, qualified to vote in elections and town affairs was held at the East Bridgewater Gordon W. Mitchell Middle School, Monday evening, June 3, 2013 at 7:30 P.M. under a Warrant issued by the Selectmen and dated May 13, 2013.

Checking voters into the auditorium alphabetically by last name were Jeanne Bennett and Patricia McElroy. Directing voters to the correct line was Donald Nelson. There were five hundred seven (507) voters present, two hundred fifty-seven (257) on the A-K voter list and two hundred fifty (250) on the L-Z voter list. Tellers appointed by Moderator, Robert Looney and sworn to duty by Town Clerk, Dina Livingston, were, James Weidenfeller, Lois Nelson, Robert Alexander, Scott Hastings, Roy Gardner and Nancy Smith. Non voters present were Marilyn Thompson, Treasurer/Collector, Phyllis Tirrell, Town Accountant, George Samia, Town Administrator, Paula S. Keefe, Asst. Town Clerk, Robert Charles, Veteran's Agent, Manuel Leite, Library Director, Kevin Feeley, Town Counsel, Laura Brown, Town Tax Title Attorney, Edward Gardner, Building Commissioner, Susan Cote, Superintendent of Schools, Paul Viera, Principal High School, Patricia Lugo, School Business Manager, Marie Grable, Director of Pupil/Personal Services, Andrew Gentile, Principal Middle School, Deb Duprey, Asst Principal Middle School, Adam Dackers, Asst Principal Middle School, Gerri Quigley, School Adj. Counselor Central School, Kate Byrne, Asst Principal Central School, Robert King, Director Information Technology School Dept., Virginia McCarthy, Middle School Teacher, and Geoff Diehl, State Representative. Recording the meeting from East Bridgewater Community Television Inc., were Russell Hannagan, Anne Kerrigan, Zach Anderson, George Lopes, Thomas McDonald, Paul Hallinan, Kathleen Wade, and Michael Brown.

The Moderator called the meeting to order at 8:49 P.M.

The delay in the start time of the meeting was due to the unforeseen large voter turnout which created longer check-in lines than anticipated.

Town Clerk, Dina Livingston, read the opening of the Warrant and the Return of Service.

The following action was taken:

Before Article 1 was presented Glenn Tattrie, Chairman of the Finance Committee read a statement on the financial standing of the town. He spoke on the school's need for an additional \$700,000.00 above the

Finance Committee budget recommendation. He stated how closely the School and Finance Committee have been working to come up with a long term solution to the repeated school deficit. A possible solution brought forth by the Finance Committee is to request the Teacher's Union to consider a change in the Health Insurance split with the Town from 80/20 to 70/30 which would equate to a substantial savings for the Town. Mr. Tattrie stated the Finance Committee will be requesting that two of the upcoming articles be amended.

Before the vote was taken on Article 1 Marcia Weidenfeller questioned if the Town Report had been completed and available to the residents. She further voiced her concern on voting an article to accept a report that was not available to the voters. Town Administrator George Samia responded stating the 2013 Town Report was complete and available for residents at the Town Hall.

ARTICLE 1 – Voted to accept the reports of the Town Officers and Committees and verbal reports.

ARTICLE 2 – Voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a contract with Mass Highway for the construction and maintenance of public highways for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2013.

William Dowling, Finance Committee member made a motion to amend this article by decreasing the sum of Free Cash going into the Capital stabilization Fund by \$116,000.00. A lengthy discussion pursued on the amendment.

ARTICLE 3 – Voted as AMENDED to raise and appropriate \$388,192.55 and appropriate and transfer from Account No. 1-0-350-3240, Free Cash, the sum of \$200,000.00 to Account No. 82-122-911-4971, Expendable Trusts, Selectmen Capital Stabilization Fund for a total of \$588,192.55.

ARTICLE 27 - Voted to appropriate the sum of \$191,000.00 for the reconstruction, repaving and related improvements of Elm Street from Highland Street to Thatcher Street, and to meet this appropriation the Treasurer

with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, be authorized to borrow \$191,000.00 under M.G.L. Chapter 44, Section 7.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLANNING COMMITTEE - RECOMMENDED UNANIMOUSLY TO APPROVE THIS ARTICLE

MODERATOR DECLARED 2/3 VOTE

Before Article 28 was voted several citizens voiced there concerns on the usage of this land once it was owned by the Town. Laura Brown, the Town's Tax Title Attorney explained that no land use stipulation could be made until the process of the taking of the land is completed. Art 28 is the 2nd step in this process.

ARTICLE 28- Voted to petition the Great and General Court of the Commonwealth to enact a so-called Home Rule Petition for the purpose stated herein, and in the form substantively similar as the following: SECTION 1. Whenever the Town of East Bridgewater has conveyed or sold any land or holds a tax title, under Chapter 60 of the General Laws, and the land meets the following criteria:

- The land transfer was memorialized by an instrument in writing, conveying or taking or purporting (1)to convey or take the land, The instrument effectuating the land transfer is duly recorded in the Registry of Deeds for the district where the land is situated; The land was or is located on any of the following East Bridgewater Assessor's Maps: 85, 86, 87, 95, 96, 104, 105 or 115; The land's description is based on a plan entitled "Plan of Land Belonging to The Hanson Land Co. Situated in the Towns of East Bridgewater and Hanson, Mass. By J.C. Torrey C.E. dated July, 1888," filed on July 18, 1888 at the Plymouth County Registry of Deeds at plan 1, page 36; and
- Either the notice or procedure for the taking and the sale or conveyance of the land, under said (2) Chapter 60, or the instrument of record thereof because of defect, irregularity or omission fails to comply with any requirement of law relating thereto, including a failure by the Town to foreclose the right of redemption, then the instrument or record of the land transfer shall, notwithstanding any deficiencies in clause (5), be effective for all purposes and shall operate to foreclose all rights of redemption to the same extent as though no such deficiencies existed, unless an instrument of redemption has been recorded prior to the effective date of this act.

SECTION 2. This act shall only apply to the instruments pertaining to any fiscal years prior to and including fiscal years 2009, 2010, 2011 and 2012, and shall not apply to any legal proceeding, commenced before the effective date of this act in the courts of this Commonwealth, in which a party has appeared asserting a cause of action claiming the right to redeem.

SECTION 3. This act shall take effect one (1) year after the effective date of this act.

ARTICLE 29- Voted to amend the current Town of East Bridgewater Zoning By-Law, SECTION 5, ALLOWED USES by adding a new sub section Z as following:

Z. INDUSTRIAL 1 OVERLAY DISTRICT (110D)

Purpose: The purpose of the Industrial 1 Overlay District is to provide locations for compatible industrial and commercial use or reuse of land underutilized by reasons of physical condition or location. The use of land within the District is intended to provide for increased tax revenues to the Town of East Bridgewater as well as employment opportunities within the community. It is the specific intent of the District to allow both industrial and/or commercial uses either in individual or in mixed-use developments designed to provide a complementary development scheme.

District Location: The Industrial 1 Overlay District is superimposed over one or more underlying zoning districts.

1. ALLOWED USES:

The following uses shall be permitted in the Industrial 1 Overlay District with Site Plan Approval in accordance with SECTION 13 of this By-Law.

(a). Enclosed manufacturing, not dangerous by reason of fire or explosion or offensive or detrimental to the Town of East Bridgewater by reason of dust, odor, fumes, refuse, noise, vibration or electrical interference.

- (b). General business and professional office building(s) including banks.
- (c). Research or testing laboratories.
- (d). Agriculture, horticulture, or floriculture.
- (e). Restaurants, not including drive-in restaurants or fast food establishments.
- (f). Retail and service establishments only if accessory to and servicing another allowed use in the District and limited to less than 1,000 (one-thousand) gross square feet per use. Floor areas greater than 1,000 (one-thousand) gross square feet may be permitted by the Planning Board by Special Permit in accordance with SECTION of this By-Law.
- (g). Allowed uses in Section 5. except as prohibited in Section above.
- (h). Multiple detached structures on any lot provided that each separate structure contains no more than ten-thousand (10,000) square feet in total ground floor area.

2. SPECIAL PERMIT ALLOWED USES:

All uses in this Section require a Special Permit from the Planning Board and Site Plan Approval in accordance with SECTION 13.

- (a). Uses in SECTIONS 5.K (1). (a)., thru 5.K.(1).(f). inclusive, except as limited by Section or prohibited by Section.
- (b). Ground mounted solar energy facilities.
- (c). A structure containing an aggregate of ten-thousand (10,000) square feet of ground floor area or more per structure.
- (d). Any other industrial or commercial use which the Planning Board may, on application, determine to be similar to a defined allowed or special permit use and in keeping with the intent of the District, but in any case not dangerous by reason of fire, explosion or offensive or detrimental to the Town of East Bridgewater by reason of emission of dust, odor, fumes, smoke, refuse, noise, vibration or electrical interference.

3. SPECIFICALLY PROHIBITED USES:

- (a). Any use not expressly permitted above or granted by Special Permit.
- (b). Outdoor advertising and billboards.
- (c). Drive-in restaurants or fast food establishments.
- (d). Hotels, motels and inns for transient or tourist homes.
- (e). Wind turbines.
- (f). Exterior storage or occupancy of mobile homes, camper trailers, inoperative or unlicensed motor vehicles, or products, materials, or vehicles not accessory to an allowed uses in the District.
- (g). Any use or structure incompatible with the nature of the District or dangerous or noxious to persons in the District or those who pass by on public ways by reason of odor, smoke, particulate emissions, fumes, noise, vibrations, glare, radiation, electrical interference, or danger of fire or explosion. Dimensional Requirements

Dimensional requirements within the Industrial 1 Overlay District shall comply with the requirements of the underlying zoning district.

Additionally the Industrial 1 Overlay District shall be applied to the area formally known as Eastern States Steel and more specifically the area bounded and described as follows:

Parcels 62-16, 62-17, 62-18, 62-19, 62-20, 62-22, 62-102, 62-155, 52-11, 61-95 and 61-149 as shown on Town of East Bridgewater Assessor's Maps *dated* and as delineated on the Town of East Bridgewater Zoning Map dated December 18, 2006, as amended from time to time.

PLANNING BD VOTED UNANIMOUSLY IN FAVOR OF THIS ARTICLE MODERATOAR DECLARED UNANIMOUS VOTE

MODERATOAR DECLARED UNANIMOUS VOTE

ARTICLE 30- Will the Town vote to amend the Zoning Bylaw of the Town of East Bridgewater Section 5, Allowed Uses, A. District R-1 (Residence 1), subparagraph (1): by adding the following subsection to the list of allowed uses:

(p) with a SPECIAL PERMIT (per Section 2 of this Bylaw) and SITE PLAN APPROVAL (per Section 13 of this Bylaw) restaurants with a gross square footage of not greater than 6,000 s. f. of gross floor area and not including of nightclubs.

ARTICLE WITHDRAWN BY PETITIONER

ARTICLE 31- Voted to amend the Town of East Bridgewater Zoning By-Law, SECTION 5, ALLOWED USES by adding a new subsection Y as follows:

Y. MUNICIPAL RECREATIONAL OVERLAY DISTRICT (MROD) With a Special Permit from the Planning Board (per Section 2 of this Bylaw) and SITE PLAN APPROVAL (per Section 13 of this Bylaw) outdoor recreational uses requiring site improvements such as athletic fields and facilities, parking, access and egress roadways, and any other directory related accessory uses may be permitted on land owned by the Town of East Bridgewater.

The following three (3) municipally owned locations shall be included in the MROD:

- Strong Field identified as Assessor Map parcels 50-32, 50-33, 50-34, and 50-62A, and currently the site of Strong Baseball Field used by the Town of East Bridgewater and accessed from Strong and Spear Avenues.
- 2. Church Street athletic fields identified as Assessor Map parcels 60-17, 61-21, and 70-6. The area is currently the site of youth baseball fields and basketball courts used by the Town of East Bridgewater and accessed from Church and Hobart Streets.
- 3. A portion of that area known as Leland Farm and identified as Assessor Map parcels 73-3, and 83-3. The area is currently the site of youth soccer fields used by the Town of East Bridgewater accessed from Belmont Street.

PLANNING BD VOTED UANIMOUSLY IN FAVOR OF THIS ARTICLE MODERATOR DECLARED UNANIMOUS VOTE

ARTICLE 32 — Voted to revise the Town of East Bridgewater Zoning Map, by changing the current East Bridgewater Zoning Map Zoning District designations from R-1 (Residence 1), to B-3 (Business 3) for additional parcels of land numbered per the East Bridgewater Assessor's maps as parcels 62-122, 63-50, 63-51, a portion of 63-49, and a portion of 63-123, at the location of TJ Smith's Restaurant (located at North Central and Cross Streets).

PLANNING BD VOTED UANIMOUSLY IN FAVOR OF THIS ARTICLE MODERATOR DECLARED UNANIMOUS VOTE

ARTICLE 33 – Voted to amend the Town of East Bridgewater Zoning By- Law, SECTION 3. DEFINITIONS by adding/inserting alphabetically a new term "OUTDOOR DINING" defined as follows:

OUTDOOR DINING – An accessory use to an existing primary use where that primary use is an indoor restaurant serving food on the premises. Outdoor Dining shall only be allowed by a Special Permit granted by the Planning Board. The outdoor dining area shall be connected to and be located immediately adjacent to the existing and lawfully operating restaurant and shall be under the responsible direction and sole control of the restaurant. In conjunction with the Special Permit the proposed outdoor dining shall be reviewed per the site plan approval section of this By-Law and shall require a formal Site Plan. The total number of seats (both indoors and outdoors) shall not exceed the restaurant's existing maximum number of seats. No signs are permitted in the outdoor dining area except those signs that are specifically permitted under this Zoning By-Law. All forms of amplified sound, speakers, TV's, video screens, etc. outdoor are prohibited, and amplified sounds and other noise from inside the restaurant must not be audible in any outdoor dining area or at the abutting property lines. Any door from the outdoor dining area leading into the main restaurant may not be positioned to remain open or otherwise supported in an open position. The dining area must have adequate illumination during evening hours, and shall not have any illumination that creates a nuisance to abutting properties.

The restaurant and the outdoor dining area must also comply with all municipal, state and federal permitting requirements, laws and regulations.

PLANNING BD VOTED UANIMOUSLY IN FAVOR OF THIS ARTICLE MODERATOR DECLARED UNANIMOUS VOTE

The following were sworn to faithful performance of their duties by Town Clerk, Dina Livingston: Precinct I — Warden; Marijo Martin, Clerk; Susan Gillpatrick, Howard V Post, Sandra Lavalle, Barbara Putt and Donald Almeida; Precinct II — Warden; Melissa Schrader, Clerk; Elaine Sands, Patricia Short, Elizabeth Hayes, and Edward Fopiano; Precinct III — Warden; Lois Nelson, Clerk; Joyce Fopiano, Louise Almeida, Katherine Jasmin, Sharon Dunn, and Joyce Eastman; Precinct IV — Warden; Donald Nelson, Clerk; Elaine Meuse, Deanne Flint, Janet Bobigian, Patricia McElroy, and Ethelyn Fowler. Precinct II only had one election worker at check out do to a last minute illness of a scheduled election worker.

Two (2) Provisional ballots had been voted and zero (0) were validated and tabulated.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL ON AGING

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of East Bridgewater:

It is with great pleasure that I submit the Council on Aging's 2013 annual report.

2013 began with much anticipation as the Council on Aging started packing up the items housed in the Gladys Farren Cottage, the Council's home for more than 20 years. After many years of hard work and planning, the doors of The Center at Sachem Rock Senior/Community Center, the new home of the East Bridgewater Council on Aging, opened its doors on February 4, 2013.

The Center provided the COA with much needed space and Activities Director, Susan L. Prendergast, planned a large variety of events throughout the year providing something of interest to a wide range of older residents, their families and caregivers. In February, the Council on Aging sponsored their 4th annual Intergenerational Winter Party. It was the first large event held at The Center just two short weeks after our move. Entertainment and pizza were provided for older residents accompanied by their grandchildren, children, nieces, nephews or young friends. Thank you to the National Honor Society of East Bridgewater High School and their advisor, Mrs. Denise Cronin, for their assistance with this event. Other entertainment opportunities this year included "Dancing Through the Decades with Dance Caliente" sponsored, in part, by a grant from the East Bridgewater Arts Council, Sgt. Daniel Clark, "The Singing Trooper" and our 1st Annual Ladies Spring Tea. The Sachem Center for Health and Rehabilitation in East Bridgewater provided entertainment and cake at a September birthday party and returned again in November to instruct in the making of a Thanksgiving craft. Our other annual events including the Watermelon Social and BBQ held at the Commercial Club, and the Ice Cream Social and Halloween Party held at The Center.

Educational options were plentiful with offerings for most everyone's interests. They included six Basic Computer Workshops. Special thanks to Russ Hannagan, East Bridgewater Cable TV Executive Director, for planning and instructing these classes. Other offerings were Plymouth County Register of Deeds, John Buckley who spoke on the Homestead Act, "Landscaping for the Birds" by Sally Avery of Massachusetts Audubon, a presentation by Lisa Budge-Johnson on the Elephant Sanctuary in Tennessee, "Coffee and Conversation" with Margaret Alexander who answered questions about the Sachem Rock Farm property in this very informative presentation, "Mosquito Awareness" by the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project, "Women & Finance-Your Relationship with Money" by Tom Burke, VP of South Shore Bank, "Investing For/At Retirement" by Joseph Benson, Investment Advisor with Primerica, "How Health Care Reform will Affect Medicare Beneficiaries" by representatives from the S.H.I.N.E. Regional Office, "The Older and Wiser Driver" presented by AAA and Sgt. William Patterson of the East Bridgewater Police Department, and Old Colony Elder Services who gave a presentation on their Money Management Program. The COA also hosted an update on the Junior/Senior High School building project. Superintendent Susan Cote and High School principle Paul Vieira gave an informative presentation and answered many questions.

With more space for programs and presentations, the COA was able to offer many health related topics including hearing screenings by Mass Audiology, "Sun & Heat Safety" presented by Eric Wojcik, Director of Oncology and Jan Amorello, oncology nurse, Good Samaritan Medical Center, "Put Pain in its Place" by Judith Levine of the Arthritis Foundation, File of Life Medication and Medical History List reviews by Kathy McLaughlin, R.N., a six week Adult Bereavement Program sponsored and facilitated by Beacon Hospice, Inc., "Living with Diabetes" presented by the Royal Health Group, and a six week class presented by Old Colony Elder Services for those dealing with chronic disease symptoms titled "My Life, My Health". We also offered a twice weekly blood pressure clinic as well as a podiatry clinic held four times a year.

Recreational and fitness opportunities included basket weaving, crocheting, back alley bridge, whist, mah jongg, line dance/exercise, chair and mat yoga and our Walking Club and trail walking groups that met during the nice weather months. Our long standing cribbage, tai chi and "Busy Hands" groups continued to meet on a weekly basis. All groups are always eager to welcome new participants. A Monday morning coffee hour was added in July and provides a place to relax and enjoy a cup of coffee and conversation. Trips were also plentiful throughout the year. Thank you to the Trustees of the Home for Aged Men in the City of Brockton for underwriting the cost of several of these trips.

The Center was happy to welcome the Senior Citizen's Club in September after meeting for many years at the Commercial Club. The Club meets monthly on the 3rd Wednesday of the month except for January, February,

July and August. The Center was also happy to host meetings for several community groups throughout the course of the year including the DPW, Plymouth County Fire Chiefs, Retired Central School Teachers, the East Bridgewater Garden Club, The Cultural Center of the Blind, the Special Education Parents Advisory Council and an East Bridgewater Girl Scout Troop that meets at The Center twice monthly. We were also pleased to show off our new facility to a group from East Bridgewater High School's Class of 1958.

Thank you to Joe Benson from Joseph Benson Tax Services who, once again, prepared tax returns for a nominal fee for older residents of the town. Joe is kept very busy with appointments during tax preparation season. This service is most appreciated by those who avail themselves of it.

The COA van was on the road for a trip to the Plymouth waterfront, Southeastern Regional Vocational Technical High School in Easton for a "Day of Beauty and Lunch" and an annual favorite, the "Christmas Tree Tour & Tea" at Island Terrace in Lakeville.

In April, Old Colony Elder Services opened a congregate meal site at The Center. Catered, nutritious and tasty meals are served every week on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday for a donation of \$2.50. Please call the COA to make your reservation. In July, the COA held a catered "Christmas in July" roast turkey dinner for the same donation of \$2.50. Over eighty enjoyed the event complete with holiday decorations and music.

In November, The Center was pleased to sponsor, in conjunction with the American Red Cross, its first Blood Drive. With over 20 donors, the drive was deemed a success by the Red Cross and we look forward to hosting this worthwhile community event again next year.

One hundred sixty-nine enjoyed the Council on Aging's Annual Christmas Party held at the Commercial Club with entertainment, door prizes, dancing and a delicious turkey dinner catered by Roche Brothers. Thank you to the Trustees of the Home for Aged Men in the City of Brockton for providing a grant which helped to defray the cost of this popular event. Thank you also to the many area establishments and residents who provided door prizes. East Bridgewater's Girl Scout Troops, Daisy through Senior level, also provided wonderful door prizes, placemats, centerpieces and decorations. Thank you to the girls and their leaders who spent much time and effort making this event truly special for our older residents.

We are grateful to the Lion's Club for again sponsoring their annual Senior BBQ held on Father's Day as well as the Standish Sportsmen's Club for the Senior Roast Beef Dinner held in August. Thank you also to the Whitman Knights of Columbus who welcome East Bridgewater seniors to their Thanksgiving Day dinner, held the weekend prior to the holiday, and to the Country Club of Halifax for including East Bridgewater residents in their annual Thanksgiving Day dinner.

In her capacity as newsletter editor, Susan creates a monthly newsletter filled with information about upcoming Council on Aging presentations, trips, activities and articles of particular interest to older adults, their families and caregivers. The newsletter is mailed or hand delivered to every household in East Bridgewater with a resident age 60 and older. It is printed by Bridgewater Print & Copy Center. Thank you to the East Bridgewater Friends of Seniors for their assistance with printing costs. If you prefer to read your newsletter online, you may do so at www.eastbridgewaterma.org in the COA section. Please let us know if this is your preference and we will take you off our mailing list. Since the newsletters are returned to us at our expense if they are not deliverable, please let us know if you are traveling and we will take you off the mailing list and reinstate you when you return. The COA continues to have a page on Facebook. In an effort to keep residents informed, we also post upcoming events and announcements on East Bridgewater's Cable TV station. If you have suggestions for future trips or events, or would like to place an item in the newsletter, please contact Susan at the Council on Aging.

Kelley Long, Client Services Coordinator, assisted many residents of all ages with fuel assistance and S.N.A.P. applications as well as with emergency financial, fuel and food needs. Thank you to the East Bridgewater Charitable Committee of the Bridgewater Savings Bank for their continued generosity. Their donations were used to assist those gualified residents who found themselves with an unexpected or emergency financial hardship.

Once again, Kelley was kept busy providing S.H.I.N.E. (Serving the Health Information Needs of Everyone) Counseling during Medicare's open enrollment period from October 15 through December 7. The COA was also pleased to welcome volunteer S.H.I.N.E. Counselor, Joan Smith, who assists residents one day a week at The Center. A large number of residents aging into the Medicare system also sought information on supplemental and Medicare D Prescription Drug Plans. The Council on Aging encourages residents approaching the age of 65, and

in need of Medicare supplemental insurance and prescription drug coverage, to become informed about the process well before that coverage is needed. The Council on Aging also assists disabled residents of any age with health insurance enrollment and trouble shooting. Please call the Council on Aging at 508-378-1610 to make an appointment if you are in need of information or assistance.

The Council on Aging was pleased to receive a grant through the MassDOT Community Transit Program for a new, eight passenger van which was received in December. Gerd "Gerry" Voss continued to drive our van and professionally provide much needed transportation to some of East Bridgewater's older and disabled residents who depend on this service. John "Jack" Sullivan, long time van driver, made the decision to semi-retire but is always available to drive if needed. Thanks to Jack for his many years of faithful service! The Council on Aging provides transportation for weekly shopping trips and for COA sponsored events. In 2013, residents could travel weekly to either Truccchi's or Market Basket, around the town on our weekly errand van or on a monthly mall trip. In addition, the Council on Aging continued to provide transportation to older and disabled residents for individual appointments in East Bridgewater and surrounding communities through Dial-A-Bat. On Wednesday and Friday of each week, rides to Boston can also be arranged through Dial-A-Bat for medical appointments only. Residents over the age of 60 or those of any age who have either a documented permanent or temporary disability can use Dial-A-Bat services. Residents can arrange a ride by calling the COA at least 24 hours in advance of the needed ride.

In 2013, the Volunteer Driver Program provided 55 rides to 6 clients. This program is for East Bridgewater residents age 60 or older who have medical appointments outside of Dial-A-Bat's service area and have no other means of transportation to get to their destination. The program currently has 8 volunteers whose mileage expenses are reimbursed by Old Colony Planning Council. The residents who are in need of this service are most appreciative of our volunteers. If you would like to volunteer for the program or find yourself in need of the service, please call Kelley Long at the COA.

The TRIAD/S.A.L.T. (Seniors And Law Enforcement Together) Council was able to increase its programming and sponsored a well attended Safety & Wellness Fair for Seniors in June, a presentation by Executive Director Nancy Morris and her Assistant Leslie Lundstrom of the East Bridgewater Housing Authority, a representative of the South Shore Humane Society who spoke on the feral cat problem and a CPR class presented by Lt. Keith McCartney of the East Bridgewater Fire Department. The S.A.L.T. Council meets on the second Thursday of the month at 9:30AM and is always looking for new members interested in keeping seniors safe in their homes and community.

The Council on Aging continues to offer a daily "Friendly Call" or a "Friendly Visit" to all those who request the service. Please contact Kelley Long at the COA if you are interested in having someone check on your well-being either by phone or with a visit at a specified time and day/days. The Plymouth County Sheriff's Department also offers a free daily call through their "Are You OK?" Program. Please call the Sheriff's Department directly at 1-800-622-4300 for further details.

The Senior Property Tax Workoff Program again provided 42 jobs for qualified East Bridgewater residents. For FY14, in an effort to better align the program with the issuance of property tax bills, the program was shortened to 50 hours between April 1 and December 1. Going forward, the program will revert to 100 hours between December 1 and the following November 30. These individuals worked in various town departments including the East Bridgewater Public Library, all three East Bridgewater schools, in the town hall for the Selectmen and Assessor's offices, East Bridgewater Cable Television, the Department of Public Works and the Council on Aging. This program continues to be very popular with the number of applicants far exceeding the number of available jobs.

In calendar year 2013, 132 volunteers gave the town of East Bridgewater 3,816.5 hours. Based on the Executive Office of Elder Affairs dollar value of \$20.85/hour, this gift of time is worth \$79,574.00. Throughout the year, our volunteers delivered 5182 Meals on Wheels to 45 homebound East Bridgewater residents every weekday. They also assisted the staff with cleaning of the office, emptying of our trash and recycle bins, data entry, answering phones and other general office work. Our volunteers also helped with events, prepared our monthly newsletter for mailing and delivered the newsletters to various locations throughout town. We cannot thank these volunteers enough for unselfishly giving of themselves and their time. We could not function without them.

The Council extends a big thank you to the East Bridgewater Garden Club for preparing, planting and tending two flower gardens in the center island. Their efforts in keeping the property beautiful are much appreciated.

The Council on Aging is also greatly appreciative of the small but dedicated group of residents known as "The Friends of Seniors". This group raises funds throughout the year and provides financial support to the COA for items that are not in the budget. New members are always welcome. A sincere thank you to The Friends of Seniors for hosting a wonderful Open House/Ribbon Cutting Ceremony on June 15. Thank you also to Council on Aging members and others in the Open House planning group for all their hard work in helping to plan and carry out this long awaited event. Many thanks to our Master of Ceremonies, Robert McCarthy, Esq., Rev. Donald Olson of the Community Covenant Church for providing the Invocation, and to all of the invited guests and dignitaries who took the time out of their busy schedules to join us and say a few words. Thank you to The Melodians and George Lopes for providing some wonderful music and to Libby Connell for leading us all in the singing of our National Anthem. We had an estimated 350 enjoy a beautiful day at The Center.

Jul Homer, long time Council on Aging member, resigned from The Council as a full member in November and accepted the position of Associate Member. Associate Member Dianne Kennedy Warkel was welcomed as a full member. Robert DiFazio continued as chair, Susan Muir as Secretary and B. John Morawski as Treasurer. The Council wishes to thank Jul for her many years of dedication to the seniors of East Bridgewater.

In addition to the organizations and agencies noted above, the Council on Aging is grateful to the East Bridgewater Fire and Police Departments, the Department of Public Works, Building Department, Town Administrator George Samia and the Board of Selectmen and its staff, the Town Assessor, Treasurer, and Town Clerk and their staffs, the Board of Health, the East Bridgewater Housing Authority, East Bridgewater Community Television, the East Bridgewater Public Schools, the East Bridgewater Public Library, Facilities Manager Brian Kiely, Custodian Anthony Gareri III, and East Bridgewater Veteran's Agent Robert Charles for all their help throughout the year. We also wish to thank the Massachusetts Executive Office of Elder Affairs, Old Colony Elder Services, Viking Recreation Center, the East Bridgewater Food Pantry, St. Vincent de Paul Society, the Kiwanis Club, the Salvation Army and Whitman (South Street) Dunkin Donuts.

At years end, over 3,000 residents age 60 and older resided in East Bridgewater. The Council on Aging is committed to providing programs and services that are needed now and will be needed in the future to allow our older citizens to continue to lead healthy, active and independent lives. One of the primary missions of the Council on Aging is to provide information and referrals to agencies that can meet their needs. While many people are aware that the council serves frail elders with programs such as Meals on Wheels, they may not know that there are programs and information available for a much wider age range of "older adults" as well as our disabled residents.

The Council on Aging encourages seniors and other interested residents to visit the Council on Aging office during business hours Monday 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., Tuesday through Thursday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Friday 8 a.m. to noon

REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of East Bridgewater:

In 2013 the Fire Department saw the promotions of Timothy M. Harhen from Acting Chief to Permanent Chief, Craig Winsor from Lieutenant to Captain and Jeffrey Kelley from Firefighter to Lieutenant. The Department welcomed three new full-time Firefighters to the Department. They are Gregory Doucette, William Palma and Christopher Olson. On June 30, 2013 long time member Lieutenant David Tardie retired after 37 years of service to the Town and I would like to thank him for his service and wish him well in his retirement.

The department responded to 2,417 emergencies in 2013 as follows:

1,291 patients were treated and transported to local hospitals in the Fire Department ambulances during the year. Fees collected for various statutory or local option permits were submitted to the Town Treasurer in the amount of \$11,698.00.

The Fire Department saw a 15% increase in total incidents from 2012 due in part to the February 2013 Blizzard Nemo and the ever increasing demand for Emergency Medical Services. The four day period during and following the blizzard, the Fire Department responded to over 180 calls for service. Most of those calls were for trees and/or wires down, carbon monoxide incidents, three possible structure fires and one structure fire.

My sincerest thanks to the Board of Selectmen, Town Administrator, members of the Fire Department and all other Town Department's and the citizens of East Bridgewater for their continued cooperation and assistance during the past year.

The Fire Department saw a decrease in the number of outside fires in the 2013 calendar year. The Department responded to 21 brush/woods/grass fires in 2013 compared to 27 in 2012. These fires burned approximately 2 acres of grass, trees and/or brush.

During the State allowed open burning season, which runs on a yearly basis from January 15th through May 1st, this Department issued over 800 burning permits which resulted in over 1500 renewals.

I would like to thank all the members of the Fire Department and other Town Departments for their assistance to me in the performance of my duties as Forest Warden.

The Historical Commission submits the following report of the year 2013.

The commission meets on the fourth Monday of the month at 7 p.m. in the Town Hall Conservation Commission meeting room. In May we elected the following officers: Chairman Dale Julius, Vice-chairman Rob Waterman, Treasurer Mary Ahern, and Secretary Lois Nelson. We are currently looking for several associate members to join the commission.

The Historic al Commission is anxious to obtain a meeting space of our own; and since the opening of the Center at Sachem Rock we have discussed the possibility of obtaining the Gladys Farren Cottage for our meeting place. This would also give us storage space and the potential for a museum area where East Bridgewater memorabilia could be displayed. The Selectmen are currently allowing the building to be used as the construction office by the high school builders but have indicated a willingness to turn it over to us once the building process is complete.

The commission acted on two Requests for Orders of Demolition forwarded to us by the Building Inspector. The Summer Street property was deemed not significant and the order was approved; the West Street property was deemed significant and a public hearing was held. The order was approved reluctantly after the testimonies received at the hearing and an inspection by one of our members.

In the coming year, we plan to pursue historic district status for a portion of Elmwood, a process that was started several years ago, and to look into developing the historic aspect of the Sachem Rock property.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

To the Citizens of the Town of East Bridgewater:

Organization of the Board was as follows:

The Board meets every first and third Monday of the month - 6:00 p.m. Board of Health Conference Room, Town Hall, second floor.

Office Hours: Monday 8:30 a.m. - 8:00 p.m., Tuesday through Thursday 8:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m., Friday 8:30 a.m. - noon.

From January 2013 to December 2013 the Board issued 85 Disposal Works Construction Permits of which 16 were for new construction and 69 for repairs.

In 2013 the Board of Health processed six WPAT loans to residents for septic repairs totaling \$114,320.00. We are currently in our twelfth round of funding for this program. East Bridgewater continues to be a model community for the WPAT program. Anyone interested in applying to the Loan Program can pick up a copy of the Homeowners Package at the Board of Health during regular business hours. The loan is available to any resident with a failing system that occupies the home in need of a repair and is current with town taxes/bills. The home cannot be for sale.

In 2013 the Board issued licenses to 54 Food Service Establishments. Each establishment is inspected bi-annually by Robert Philbrick to ensure compliance with state and local regulations.

The Rabies Clinic was held on June 10^{th} from 5-7 p.m. at the Town Office building to coincide with Dog Licensing at the Town Clerks office. Bonnie McArthur was our veterinarian. The clinic is to open to both dogs and cats and residents of surrounding towns. The vet charges a minimal fee of \$10.00 per animal.

The BOH received 100 doses of flu vaccine in 2013. This vaccine was offered to any resident over 18 at no charge and administered by appointment at our clinic. All 100 doses were utilized.

In 2013 the construction of the new High School was completed. A sewerage treatment plant was constructed as part of this project and after much discussion it was decided the Board of Health was the appropriate department to oversee the operation of the facility. The BOH entered into a contract with Whitewater Inc. for a period of 2 years to operate the facility. Copies of the contract are available at the BOH office.

Our Health Agent, Robert Philbrick continues to ensure compliance of all State and Local Codes for Title V Regulations as well as the Minimum Standards of Fitness for Human Habitation (State Sanitary Code).

Our Board of Health Nurse, Kathy McLaughlin is available on Tuesday and Thursday from 12:30 -2 pm. at her new location. Kathy is now seeing patients in the clinic at the Center at Sachem Rock on Plymouth Street. Call for an appointment for Blood Sugar Screenings, Blood Pressure Checks, Flu Shots and nutritional counseling.

We would like to thank all Town Departments and Boards for their continued support and cooperation throughout the year.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of East Bridgewater

Throughout 2013, the East Bridgewater Public Library saw an increasing demand for library services while the budget remained level-funded. Circulation figures increased by 10% over the previous year. In the fall of 2013, the library purchased four new computers for its patrons. Each of these computers has Internet access and Microsoft Office. Patrons are able to surf the web using our high speed Internet and work on their resumes, create spreadsheets or build a slideshow using Microsoft Office. Also, three new wireless routers were installed in various locations of the library.

Volunteers made a real difference at the library in 2013. Ann Ford continued to mend and process materials on a weekly basis. Peter Klimczik began volunteering at the library in the spring of 2013, performing collection maintenance and carpentry. Susan Murray continued to assist circulation staff shelve materials and locate items. We thank them for their dedication and generosity.

The Library's meeting room remained busy in 2013. Those using the room were the East Bridgewater Historical Society, the East Bridgewater Democratic Town Committee, Civil War Roundtable, St. John-Society of St. Vincent de Paul, Help Us Give Support (HUGS), the East Bridgewater Arts Council, North River Collaborative Family Network, Brownie Girl Scouts Troop, the East Bridgewater Foodie Group, the Sachem Quilters, the East Bridgewater Garden Club, Take Off Pounds Sensibly (TOPS), Plymouth County Genealogists and the Hockomock Digital Photographers.

One of the goals in 2013 was to increase adult programming. The library sponsored 12 adult programs including: two Digital Camera Workshops, an introduction to genealogy, mentalist Rory Raven, a program about identity theft, a workshop on writing & publishing, and two resume writing workshops. The library had two author presentations: Jeff Belanger spoke on behalf of his book *Weird Massachusetts* and Michael Tougias discussed his latest book, *A Storm Too Soon*. The library intends to increase adult programming in 2014.

The Library's Reading Club's membership increased and continues to meet on the last Tuesday of every month. The Sachem Quilters once again brightened the Library in March with their display of vibrant quilts and wall

hangings. The Hockomock Digital Photography Group displays their work around the circulation area each month.

The *Friends of the Library* sponsored the third annual "Ringing in the Season", a Christmas celebration held at the library on December 15. The event featured the Jubilate Chorale, Brockton Orchestra String Quartet and Woodwind Quintet. The Friends also held three book sales this year, patrons kindly donated books to the library which are added to the collection or sold at the book sales. We can't thank the *Friends of the Library* enough for their ongoing support.

The Children's Room provided a full schedule of story time, craft activities, community outreach, 2nd grade tours and an exciting Summer Reading Program: *Dig into Reading.* We offer our thanks for making special children's performances available: to the Friends of the Library for *Sparky's Puppets* and *Lucky Bob* and to Bridgewater Savings for the *Great Rolando*, *Toe Jam Puppet Band* and the *Animal World Experience*. The Library held its fourth annual Touch a Truck at St. John's Parish.

The East Bridgewater Public Library's museum pass program continued to be very popular with our patrons. Patrons are able to reserve these passes with a valid East Bridgewater Library card either online or at the Library. All passes and discount cards are made courtesy of individual and group donors to the public Library. We extend many thanks to all for supporting these worthy pass programs.

REPORT OF THE BUILDING COMMISSIONER/ZONING ENFORCEMENT OFFICER

To The Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of East Bridgewater

I hereby submit the Annual Report of the Planning/Building Department for 2013.

The Planning/Building Department has many diverse responsibilities. The Planning Board Administrative Assistant, Marcia Anapolsky, coordinates activity between developers and the Planning Board for new subdivisions and commercial projects. The Building Inspector oversees all building construction in Town and has regulatory responsibility in many areas, including building code compliance, zoning, architectural access, and local by-laws. Dorothy Simpson, Principal Clerk in the Planning/Building Department, also serves as the Principal Clerk of the Zoning Board of Appeals.

In 2013, this department issued 1287 permits:

416 Building Permits 262 Gas Permits 244 Plumbing Permits 365 Wiring Permits

The estimated construction cost as indicated by the building permit applications was \$11,253,134.00. Fees for the building related permits totaling \$93,773 were collected and turned over to the Town Treasurer. The total number of building related permits issued for 2013 increased by 18% over 2012. The Building Department, in cooperation with the Fire Department, also performs annual inspections of public assembly buildings. Thirty four Certificates of Inspection were issued in 2013. Fees totaling \$1,200.00 were collected and turned over to the Town Treasurer for these required inspections.

Construction of the High School project continued this year with the building opening in September for the start of the new school year. As of the end of December, Temporary Certificates of Occupancy had been issued for the school, the stadium, and waste water treatment facility and the former high school was awaiting demolition.

I would like to thank the Town Administrator and the Board of Selectmen along with all Town Departments for their assistance and support. I would like to acknowledge the Wiring and Plumbing/Gas Inspectors for their

indispensable role in making East Bridgewater a safer place to live and work. I would especially like to thank Marcia Anapolsky and Dorothy Simpson for their patience, hard work, cheerful attitudes and dedication to public service.

REPORT OF PLYMOUTH COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

The Commissioners of the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project are pleased to submit the following report of our activities during 2013.

The Project is a special district created by the State Legislature in 1957, and is now composed of all Plymouth County towns, the City of Brockton, and the Town of Cohasset in Norfolk County. The Project is a regional response to a regional problem, and provides a way of organizing specialized equipment, specially trained employees, and mosquito control professionals into a single agency with a broad geographical area of responsibility.

As a result of a winter with average snow cover, the 2013 season began with dry conditions and below average number of spring mosquitoes. Detection and treating larval mosquitoes was limited with the spring brood, because of the low water table, lack of larvae. Over 10,000 acres were aerial lavicided using the Project plane and ground larviciding using B.t.i., an environmentally selective bacterial agent. Upon emergence of the spring brood of mosquitoes, ultra-low volume adulticiding began on May 31, 2013 and ended on September 20, 2013. The Project responded to 13,692 spray requests for service from residents. As part of our West Nile Virus control strategy a total of 69,712 catch basins were treated with larvicide in all of our towns to prevent West Nile Virus (WNV).

In response to the continued threat of mosquito borne diseases in the district, we increased our surveillance trapping and ground larviciding, and adult spraying in areas of concern to protect public health.

The first virus isolations identified, in Plymouth County was on June 25, 2013, by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health State Lab, a *Culex pipiens/restuans* complex, a bird biting species was found to have West Nile Virus (WNV) in the town of Whitman. The first isolate of Eastern Equine Encephalitis virus (EEEV) from a *Culex pipiens/restuans* complex, in the town of Hanover on July 29, 2013. The 2013 season had a total of 20 EEE positive pool (50 or less mosquitoes) isolates, and 48 WNV positive pools trapped in Plymouth County as follows:

Based on guidelines defined by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health's "Vector Control Plan to Prevent WNV and EEE in Massachusetts", the season began with all 28 Plymouth County Mosquito Control towns at "Low Risk Level" for WNV. The season ended with eleven Plymouth County towns, Abington, Brockton, Rockland, Whitman, Hingham, West Bridgewater, Bridgewater, East Bridgewater, Hanson, Plympton, Kingston, and Halifax. Marshfield and Carver at the "Moderate Level" for WNV.

The season began with eleven towns at the "Moderate Risk Level" for EEE virus, West Bridgewater, Bridgewater, Middleboro, Lakeville, Rochester, Mattapoisett, Plympton, Kingston, Halifax, Marshfield and Carver. The season ended with one town, Middleboro at "Critical Risk" level and eight towns at "High Risk" level, Hanover, Rockland, Whitman, Hanson, Plympton, Halifax, and West Bridgewater. The towns of Norwell, Pembroke, East Bridgewater, Bridgewater, Kingston, Carver, Lakeville, Brockton, Abington, Hingham, and Mattapoisett end the season at "Moderate Risk" level for EEE virus.

There was no aerial intervention to reduce human biting bridge vector mosquitoes and enzootic transmission of EEE in the state this year. There were two confirmed human cases of West Nile virus in Plymouth County. There was a fatal EEE human case in Norfolk County that had a travel history in Plymouth County, in the town of Whitman. One fatal EEE horse case was reported in Middleboro with an onset date of 18 September 2013. PCMCP ended its trapping program on 16 September and DPH finished trapping on 9 October.

The Project conducted a joint research project with Bristol County Mosquito Control Project. The goal of this project was to study ways to improve the effectiveness of spring larvicide applications through the use of

some new techniques that have been recently developed. The research involved using a combination of the insecticides B.t.i. and B.s., both chemicals environmentally selective bacterial agent. The research was very successful and we were able to demonstrate improved efficacy.

The public health problem of EEE and WNV continues to ensure cooperation between the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project, local Boards of Health, Massachusetts State Reclamation and Mosquito Control Board and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health. In an effort to keep the public informed, EEE and WNV activity updates are regularly posted on The Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project website www.plymouthmosquito.org and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health website at www.state.ma.us/dph/wnv/wnv1.htm.

The figures specific to the Town of East Bridgewater are given below. While mosquitoes do not respect town lines the information given below does provide a tally of the activities which have had the greatest impact on the health and comfort of East Bridgewater residents.

Insecticide Application. 985 acres were treated using truck mounted sprayers for control of adult mosquitoes. More than one application was made to the same site if mosquitoes reinvaded the area. The first treatments were made in June and the last in September.

During the summer 1,918 catch basins were treated to prevent the emergence of *Culex pipiens*, a known mosquito vector in West Nile Virus transmission.

Water Management. During 2013 crews removed blockages, brush and other obstructions from 2,060 linear feet of ditches and streams to prevent overflows or stagnation that can result in mosquito breeding. This work, together with machine reclamation, is most often carried out in the fall and winter.

Machine Reclamation. 3,120 linear feet of upland ditch was reconstructed in East Bridgewater using the Project's track driven excavator.

Our greatest effort has been targeted at mosquitoes in the larval stage, which can be found in woodland pools, swamps, marshes and other standing water areas. Inspectors continually gather data on these sites and treat with highly specific larvicides when immature mosquitoes are present.

Finally, we have been tracking response time, which is the time between notice of a mosquito problem and response by one of our inspectors. The complaint response time in the Town of East Bridgewater was less than three days with more than 344 complaints answered.

Mosquito Survey. Our surveillance showed that the dominant mosquitoes throughout the district were generally *Culiseta melanura* and *Coquillettidia perturbans*. In the Town of East Bridgewater the three most common mosquitoes were *Cq. perturbans*, *Ae. vexans* and *Cs. melanura*.

REPORT OF THE SEALER OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES

To: The Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of East Bridgewater.

Businesses and activities in the Town that are currently being serviced by the Sealer of Weights and Measures include:

- Markets and convenience stores
- Pharmacies
- Gasoline service stations
- Industrial sites
- Propane refilling stations
- Garden centers

- Farm stands
- Youth sports
- Miscellaneous activities with scales or scanners

During calendar year 2013, a total of 152 measuring devices were inspected and sealed, and 1 device was adjusted. All required inspections and sealing activities were completed by the end of the year. All town-owned equipment is in serviceable condition and is fully utilized by the Sealer in the course of his duties.

The Commonwealth also requires retail sales dispensers of motor oil to be licensed and the Sealer checks those licenses during his annual visit. The Sealer also investigates complaints relating to scales, scanners, and gas pumps throughout the year and requires corrective action.

The Sealer attends workshops and conferences necessary to maintain state certification and necessary expertise to accomplish his job. All required certifications are current.

All fees, in the amount of \$3010.00, collected by the undersigned in relation to the appointed office have been appropriately turned into the Office of the East Bridgewater Town Treasurer.

The annual report was filed prior to January 31, 2013, as required by state law. A copy of the report is on file at the Town Hall.

SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL SERVICES GROUP

The Southeastern Regional Services Group (SERSG) was initiated in 1993 with a mission "to serve as a catalyst and implementer for member communities that desire to act jointly to solve governmental problems or to deliver services to their citizens more effectively or efficiently." The nineteen member communities of SERSG benefit from shared administrative services provided by a regional administrator. Lara Thomas has served as regional administrator of SERSG since 2004. SERSG's work is supported by dues from the member communities.

Annual procurements designed to save municipalities time and money are a major part of SERSG's services. Cooperative procurements for Office Supplies, Paper, DPW Supplies and Water and Sewer Treatment Chemicals were held in the spring of 2013. More than thirty different supplies are procured for the East Bridgewater Department of Public Works. In the fall, SERSG coordinated procurement of more than twenty categories of DPW Services.

As a participant in SERSG's office supply contract, East Bridgewater now enjoys a discount of 76.52% off non-excluded office supplies in the United Stationer's Supply wholesaler's catalog and more than 50% off ink and toner cartridges. Tens of thousands of dollars are generally saved by SERSG communities off list prices for office supplies, and the Town also pays a fixed competitive price for cartons of paper through the SERSG paper contract.

The estimated value of supplies and services procured for the DPW totaled more than \$1.5 Million during 2013. In addition to the savings of time due to SERSG handling the entire procurement up until contract execution, additional savings per year result from contract pricing. For example, East Bridgewater pays \$11.75 per ton while the latest available state contract price was \$13.64 per ton and up. A survey of five varieties of delivered stone items indicates SERSG's prices were lower than the lowest state contract price by an average of more than \$5.50 per ton. State contract pricing for sodium hypochlorite is almost 80 cents per gallon more than the SERSG contract The lowest price increment for Ultra Low Sulfur Diesel purchases on the state contract is more than 3 cents per gallon while SERSG's increment is less than 2 cents per gallon. Taking into account these items alone, East Bridgewater is saving more than its membership dues based on estimated usage.

In addition to an annual survey on snowplowing rates and payment policies, SERSG sponsored a hoisting license training in April at a significantly reduced rate for SERSG members. A grant proposal for \$365,000 was also submitted by SERSG to develop a stormwater collaborative using funding from the Commonwealth's Community Innovation Challenge Grant program. Grant awards will be announced in February 2014.

Finally, monthly meetings of the Board of Directors and the Highway and DPW Superintendents continued to provide valuable opportunities for representatives from member communities to share concerns and receive ideas and feedback about a wide variety of issues affecting municipalities.

VETERANS' SERVICE REPORT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of East Bridgewater:

As the wars and conflicts continue, we pray for the safe return of our Troops. Veterans' issues are of great interest to our community. Considering our country's problems, our Troops are in the forefront of our mind! Freedom is a gift that comes at a cost and must always be cherished and protected.

Throughout our Nation's history, the men and women of America's Armed Forces have preserved our freedom, protected our security and upheld our democratic values. Joining the ranks of these heroes are the thousands who have been held as prisoners of war or whose fate has never been resolved. Many have been lost in the chaos of battle, the grief of their loss made more acute for their families and their fellow Americans because of the inability to determine whether they perished or survived. Americans will never forget those who have borne the indignities and sufferings of captivity in service to our country, those missing in action or those who died.

In the 18th century, towns in the Massachusetts Bay Colony provided assistance to their needy veterans of the French and Indian War (1754-1763) between France and Great Britain, fought in North America. The Commonwealth of Massachusetts began providing for its veterans immediately following the Revolutionary War. In 1861 the State Legislature formalized the assistance provided to veterans by establishing Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 115 and the Department of Veterans' Services. In every city and town in the Commonwealth, the legislature created the offices of Director of Veterans Services, Burial Agent and Graves Officer in recognition of the military services and associated sacrifices by its citizens who protected and defended the United States.

It was the desire of the state and local government leaders to recognize this service in our armed forces by providing certain essential benefits to men and women (both living and deceased) who had borne the burden of military duty and to their families in order to honor them by providing benefits that were earned by their service. Chapter 115 enables every eligible Massachusetts veteran to receive certain financial, medical, educational, employment and other benefits. Massachusetts General Law requires every city and town maintain a Department of Veterans' Service Officer either part time or full time. From the start in 1861, the veterans within the Commonwealth of Massachusetts have not been forgotten. We of the Massachusetts Veterans' Service Department are committed to assist veterans and their dependents with concern, compassion and dedication!

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts has insured that no individual who served his or her state and nation with honor would ever be pauperized or forced to turn to public welfare for assistance. The Massachusetts Executive Office and the Massachusetts House and Senate have shown their continued concern for the welfare of the veteran and his or her dependents with the fullest support of one of the most comprehensive programs for veterans in the country, the Department of Veterans' Services and the local Department of Veterans' Services.

The mission of the East Bridgewater office is to provide eligible veterans and their families who are residents of East Bridgewater, financial assistance and medical reimbursements in accordance with a formula that takes into account the number of dependents and income from all sources under the provisions of Massachusetts General Law, Chapter 115. Eligible dependents of deceased veterans are provided with the same benefits as if the veteran were still living. In addition to processing claims for Chapter 115 benefits, I also advise Veterans on the process for VA Health Care enrollment and provide proof of Veteran status to funeral directors and render burial benefit information to the next of kin of deceased veterans. The Veterans Service Office also provides copies of military discharge paperwork to veterans or their dependents. This office also refers veterans to the VA hospital, housing, employment and educational services.

I respectfully request that everyone set aside some time in their busy schedules to remember and keep in their prayers the brave men and women who are in harms way, protecting us and ensuring our freedom.

I would like to thank the Town of East Bridgewater for their support and compassion for veterans past and present. Let's rededicate ourselves to our country, our veterans and their families.

REPORT OF EAST BRIDGEWATER COMMUNITY TELEVISION, INC.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of East Bridgewater:

On Behalf of the Board of Directors, Staff, and Membership of East Bridgewater Community Television, Inc., (EBCTV) we are pleased to submit our annual report for 2013.

East Bridgewater Community Television, a non profit Public, Educational, and Government Access Cable Television Facility, serving East Bridgewater residents, the Town of East Bridgewater Government, and the East Bridgewater School Department by operating the community's three (3) P.E.G. Access Channels (Public, Educational, & Government).

Our Staff consists of one full time Executive Director and one full time Assistant Director. Our Board of Directors consists of five (5) members. One Board member is appointed by the East Bridgewater Board of Selectmen and one Board member is appointed by the East Bridgewater School Department. The three (3) remaining Board members are elected on a regular basis by the East Bridgewater Community Television Membership. East Bridgewater Community Television Membership consists of Town Residents, Local Town, State and Federal Government Officials, Town School Department Officials, Locally Based Business Owners and Locally Based Non-Profit Organizations.

East Bridgewater Community Television is a member, in good standing, of the Alliance for Community Media, the national grassroots organization responsible for preserving, protecting and defending all forms of electronic freedom of speech. EBCTV is also a member of the state wide chapter of the A.C.M. known as MASS-ACCESS.

The EBCTV Board of Directors and Staff works on a constant basis to facilitate its membership in electronic freedom of speech through training in a wide spectrum of electronic forms of communication including but not limited to Cable Television show production, Electronic Community Bulletin Board creation and internet webcasting. Members are trained through hands on participation in Field Videography, In-Studio Production, Non-Linear Computer Editing, and Computer Based Graphics and animation.

East Bridgewater also educates the Children of East Bridgewater, by operating each summer two separate Video Production Summer Camps. The East Bridgewater Community Television Kids Video Camp serves Children ages eight (8) to ten (10) teaching them basic and essential skills in Video Production and electronic story telling. The second East Bridgewater Community Television Video Camp serves Teens ages eleven (11) to fourteen years of age. This camp teaches the advanced skills of non-linear computer based editing and further enhances the teens' skills in electronic story telling.

In addition to the Video Camps, East Bridgewater Community Television also acts as an Extracurricular High School based club for East Bridgewater High School Students. The students elect their own club officers, work on a variety of interesting video projects and create a weekly educational newscast which helps train club members as News Anchors, Field Reporters, On-Screen

Sportscasters, On-Screen Weather Forecasters, Technical Directors, Studio Floor Directors, Studio and Field Camera Operators, Teleprompter Operators, and Audio and Charter Generator Operators. In addition to the newscast, club members also participate in a wide variety of in studio and on location television productions, giving the students valuable hands on training for future possible vocations in the media of television, motion pictures and other various electronic mediums.

East Bridgewater Town and School Department Members, Residents, and Locally Based Business Members and Locally Based Non-Profit Organizations are also facilitated and trained to create their own programming to communicate their non-commercial messages throughout the community via cable television. In addition, Town Departments and Non Profit organizations are trained, facilitated and given access to one of the three (3) community-based Electronic Bulletin Board systems. Each Bulletin Board system represents one of the three P.E.G. channels and authorized members are trained to create messages specifically for that venue. EBCTV also works closely with Town, State and Federal Officials to get their message of Government Operations to their constituents on a continuing basis.

2013 has been a very big and exciting year for East Bridgewater Community Television as we transitioned from our small cramped facility at the old East Bridgewater High School to a new, larger, state of the art facility within the new East Bridgewater Junior Senior High School. Our engineers worked massive hours installing new high definition, digital studio cameras, a whole new control room configuration and fiber optic connections between town hall as well as six new remote locations within the new High School. For the first time ever East Bridgewater Community Television was capable of telecasting EB High School Basketball games with multiple cameras live on the Educational Channel.

None of the new EBCTV equipment cost the taxpayers of East Bridgewater a single cent since all the costs were covered within the 10 year contract signed between the community of East Bridgewater and the Comcast Cable Company.

East Bridgewater Community Television continues to strive to enhance, improve and facilitate new and veteran members to create more and better video programming along with various other forms of electronic communication for the betterment of the community.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDANT OF SCHOOLS

To The East Bridgewater School Committee and Citizens of the Town of East Bridgewater

It continues to be a pleasure to serve as the Interim School Superintendent in East Bridgewater. I was immediately taken by the pleasant atmosphere and genuine kindness of the people.

During the summer of 2013 our primary focus was to ensure the logistical reality of the school district's reorganization. For our administrators, custodians, and secretarial staff the challenges were staggering, and yet they rose to the occasion magnificently.

The completing and opening of the new East Bridgewater Junior/Senior High School was a monumental feat. Every person from Fontaine Brothers Construction, Collaborative Partners, the Architectural Firm of Ai#3, and the Town Agencies united in a singular mission to ensure the building was ready to be occupied by our students on August 29, 2013.

I can't express sufficiently the incredible cooperation we received from the Building, Health, Fire, Police and D.P.W. Departments in town.

Of great satisfaction to me was watching the community come through the new Junior/Senior High School during our tours sponsored by the administration. The look of awe and pride permeated the faces of the young and old alike. It was evident that people were proud to have as a center piece of their community a Junior/Senior High School of the future.

To commemorate the opening of the new East Bridgewater Junior/Senior High School we conducted a Dedication and Ribbon Cutting Ceremony on November 27, 2013. The community turned out enthusiastically to honor Dr. Judith A. Riordan, former Superintendent of Schools, Mr. George McCabe, former teacher and current track coach, and Mrs. Anne Kenneally Hynes, former School Librarian.

As a school district we have serious structural deficits that will take at least two years to correct. My immediate concern is the insufficient number of administrators who are responsible for ensuring the integrity of institutional quality controls.

All current educational research makes a strong connection between educational leadership and staff and student performance. While your current educational leaders are superb, there are not enough of them to provide systemic leadership in the areas of curricula alignment, continuity of content, and habits of mind.

To date the School Committee's communication with the Finance Committee, Board of Selectmen and the Town Administrator George Samia have been cordial, constructive and productive. It is my sincere hope that this dialog will result in a school budget that will address our most serious liabilities.

When my tenure as the Interim Superintendent ends on December 31, 2014 I will leave East Bridgewater with warm thoughts about its people and what an honor it has been to serve the children of this fine community.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the honorable Board of Selectmen and the citizens of East Bridgewater:

It is my distinct honor to submit this 2013 annual report as chairperson of the East Bridgewater School Committee.

The year 2013 was one of the busiest years in the history of the East Bridgewater school department; the opening of the new Junior/Senior High School was a monumental task that will impact our community for decades. In addition, the committee reorganized our grade structure by moving grade three to the Gordon Mitchell Middle School and grades seven and eight to the new building. This created more classroom space in the Middle School and Central School allowing for in house development of "substantially separate" classrooms for East Bridgewater students who would otherwise have to be transported to costly out of district placements. This has a positive impact on our ever expanding pupil personnel budget and keeps our children in East Bridgewater. The beautiful new building offers our students a 21st century education with modern technology and facilities that meet every educational need. There have been some complications involving leaks, boiler issues, change orders etc. but relatively few given the size of the project. The building opened on time, we are still on budget, and the ongoing site work is only slightly behind schedule. The town will benefit greatly from the beautification of the whole area from the common down to route 18 and also because the new waste water treatment facility covers the future septic needs of the fire department, Central School and the Junior/Senior High School. The septic systems in the schools and fire department had been condemned by the state authorities. We are certain that there will be ample capacity to add the Town Hall also to this system in the future.

The FY 14 budget process was extremely difficult made even more challenging because of the cost of opening the new school. Reorganization of grade levels saved the town substantial money because it allowed us to qualify for the model school program which brought with it approximately 65% construction reimbursement to the town. But reorganization had a cost as well; special subject area teachers for seventh and eighth grade students had to be hired because middle school teachers could not simply be moved up to Junior /Senior High level. These potential costs had been well documented by the school committee. We went to town meeting with an \$800,000 deficit to meet the requested level funded budget. The town Finance Committee worked diligently with the school committee to bridge the gap and thankfully a \$400,000 increase to the school budget was approved by the Finance Committee and voted by citizens at the Town Meeting. Unfortunately, that \$400,000 was a one- time fix and was not added to the operating budget, creating an issue for the FY15 budget. The final budget number was 16,548,893 very similar to the 2007 school budget of 16,374,983 and less than the 2010 school budget of 16,742,215.

In January of 2013 Superintendent Cote advised us that she intended to resign her position effective June 30, 2013. The School Committee immediately reached out to the Massachusetts Association of School Committees and the Massachusetts Association of School Superintendents to solicit recommendations for a Superintendent of Schools. Both Agencies recommended we hire an interim superintendent and in May of 2013 we advertised for an Interim Superintendent. We received eight applications and interviewed three candidates. At the conclusion of the process, we selected Mr. John A. Moretti, a retired superintendent. Mr. Moretti had a distinguished fifteen year career as a superintendent and had experience serving as a consultant for the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education in the Division of Accountability, Partnership and Assistance. Of particular interest to us was Mr. Moretti's experience working with the Massachusetts School Building Authorities model school program. Mr. Moretti's mentoring, experience and expertise was invaluable to the district in completing the project for the opening of the school on August 26, 2013. Because of Mr. Moretti's exemplary work the committee decided to ask the Board of Education for a waiver to allow him to stay for six more months until December 31, 2014; that waiver was granted.

Other significant committee news, activities and actions:

In February the committee voted to establish a sub- committee to discuss with town leaders the
need for a Facilities manager. The process went very well and by September the town hired Brian
Kielly as the new Facilities manager under the jurisdiction of the DPW. A memorandum of
Understanding for Maintenance and Custodial Services between the School Committee and
selectmen was signed.

- Under the School Choice Law, every city, town, or regional school district is required to enroll
 non-residents under the school choice plan unless the school committee votes prior to June 1st
 not to participate for the following school year. The committee voted to not participate in the 201314 school year.
- At the reorganization meeting of April 11, School Committee officers were elected: George
 McCabe as Chair, Jennifer Kitchenham as Vice-Chair and Michael Power as Secretary. Other
 members of the committee include Elizabeth Hayes, Heather Graham, and Keith Boyle. Members
 also assumed responsibilities for the many subcommittees.
- The School Committee approved the recommendation of the dedication sub-committee to name hallway streets at the new Jr/Sr. High School after Gordon W. Mitchell, Stanley B. Goldman, Michael J. McCarthy, Joseph Morey and Community Street.
- The committee voted also to name the new Library after Anne Kenneally Hynes, the new Performing Arts Center after Dr. Judith Riordan and the new Track after George McCabe.
- The School Committee approved the use of the old High School building for training purposes before the September demolition. Groups using the building will be the SEMLEC Swat Team, the East Bridgewater Fire Department, and the East Bridgewater Police Department. The project was supervised by Sergeant Michael McLaughlin.
- In June the School Committee acknowledged four teacher retirees and thanked them for their years of service to the district. Catherine Backstrom, Deborah Bourne, Debra Cournoyer and Virginia Hunt. The retirees gave a combined 115 years of service to the district.
- In September the School Committee approved the sale of surplus materials and furniture from the
 old High School. Middle and Central schools were given first choice for the items, and then all
 town departments were given the opportunity to examine what was available and useful to them.
 After that the public was given the opportunity to purchase what was left. Superintendent Moretti
 supervised the process and \$10,207 was raised and per law transferred to the town's general
 fund.
- From September to December the committee worked hard negotiating with all union and non-union employees in an attempt to change employee healthcare contributions from 80-20 to 70-30.

 The committee was successful with all employees with the exception of the teacher's association.

 The teacher's association was reluctant to negotiate until an outstanding previous health care law suit with the town was settled.
- In October Superintendent Moretti, with the assistance of the principals, reviewed the Districts 2013 MCAS results. Grades 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, and 9 showed improvement across the board with ELA and Mathematics scores increasing in both the proficient and advanced levels. Grade 7 had a slight dip indicating there is work to be done with this grade level. The Committee received the outstanding news that 48 students are the recipients of the John and Abigail Adams Scholarship award, allowing them free in state tuition as a result of outstanding performance on the MCAS tests.
- The October 1, 2013 student population report was read with the good news being shared that the student population has increased by 48. The Jr/Sr High School has seen the largest growth with 29 additional students added to the population. This trending is an important byproduct of the new building according to Superintendent Moretti. The report is significant for the district as the student enrollment helps to determine the amount of state funding it receives. Every new student represents between \$4000-5000 to the district.
- After regretfully receiving Michael Power's resignation from the School Committee, the Committee, according to law, accepted applications to fill the vacated School Committee position. The Selectmen and Committee interviewed the applicants at a joint meeting. The candidates were: Paul Forrest, Valerie Mason, Gordon McKinnon, and Jonathan White. The candidates were asked questions by the School Committee and the Board of Selectman; each Candidate was then given an opportunity to respond. Upon completion a roll call vote was taken and Mr. Gordon McKinnon was chosen to fill the vacant seat. The roll call was as follows:

- Annually the Massachusetts Association of School Superintendents awards a certificate for academic excellence. Three candidates were considered for the award and Superintendent Moretti chose Michael Frederick Woods to receive this certificate for Academic Excellence. Mr. Moretti chose Michael using a rubric that was based upon transcripts, MCAS and SAT scores, GPA, and course selection. Michael not only excels in academics but is also a student athlete who is held in high regard by his peers. Superintendent Moretti said, "This young man represents all that is good and decent about the East Bridgewater Public Schools."
- NEASC Accreditation- Principal Vieira read a letter he received from NEASC stating that the NEASC Committee voted unanimously to remove the high school from probation for the Standards for Accreditation on Curriculum and Community Recourses for Learning. Additionally, the Committee commended the new state of the art building that meets the needs to achieve a 21st century learning experience.
- In November the School Committee hosted the ribbon cutting and dedication ceremony for the new Junior / Senior High school. Beautiful speeches were made by those being recognized and a lovely convocation was done by Father Wally. Many people worked behind the scenes to make it a success. For the dedication ceremony, the committee owes many thanks to Barbara Polese, Beth Hayes and John Moretti for their organizational skills.

For thanking people for the very existence of the new school building Beth Hayes said it best with her description in the publication "Our Town":

"The new school has opened and the ribbon cutting ceremony is scheduled for 4:00 PM on Thanksgiving Eve. It's time to say thank you to the many individuals and groups that have been directly involved in the advancement of this project. Once the Massachusetts School Building Authority indicated that East Bridgewater was a possible candidate for a new school, our legislators stepped up. Led by Senator Tom Kennedy and then-Representative Allen McCarthy and assisted by Senator Brian Joyce and newly-elected Representative Geoff Diehl, the need for a new school was strongly promoted by our legislative delegation, which was vital in obtaining the final approval. Next, a School Building Committee was assembled to guide the project. A list of the members of this group is long but their names are posted on a plaque in the lobby of the new school. Special recognition must be given to the SBC co-chairs, David Floeck and Susan Cote, whose responsibilities extended far beyond that of any other member. In 2011, ABC (A Better Community) made sure that voters at Special Town Meeting and the ballot were informed – and they certainly were successful. Early on, the architectural firm, Ai3, was hired, which boosted the confidence level of both the MSBA and the voters. Following that, the Owner's Project Manager (Simon Tempest from Collaborative Partners) and the construction company (Fontaine Bros.) were hired. Elected and appointed officials and others, too numerous to name, have continuously given of their time and talents to the successful completion of this project. Many of them are not members of the SBC, but they have attended construction meetings and generously assisted when needed. The town's financial team attended regular meetings to review all fiscal components of the project. The Board of Health assumed responsibility for the new wastewater treatment plant, a vital component of the project as well as an aspect of the project that may benefit more than the schools in the future. Steve Culp of Culp Designs volunteered to design and maintain the new school website (www.newebschool.org), reliably posting photos, meeting minutes, announcements and other important information on the

website. If you're a Facebook fan, you've probably visited "You know you're from East Bridgewater if..." and viewed the many dazzling photos that **Bob Philbrick** posted. Even though residents were not allowed on the construction site, through Bob's photography and comments, residents have been able to understand the evolution of this project through Bob's behind-the-scenes observations. And, of course, none of this would have happened without the **voters**, who saw the need and responded. We give thanks for the efforts of all the people above. Spread the word about the celebrations on November 27 at 4:00 PM — we have much to be thankful for this year."

REPORT OF THE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

A distinguished group of coaches led our student-athletes to multiple tournament berths and championships as we closed the doors of E.B.H.S in June and embraced the future on our modern campus in September.

As we began the 2013 Spring season baseball and softball once again met the high standards of expectations that the East Bridgewater athletic program is known for. Both teams qualified for the MIAA tournament and baseball shared the South Shore League crown.

Senior Kevin Lynch was named the MIAA "Student of the Month" in May.

Boys Track & Field won the South Shore League Championship for the seventh consecutive year. Girls Tennis fielded their largest squad to date. Girls Track and Field had many outstanding individual performances, all the more remarkable when you consider they didn't have a home track to practice on due to construction.

Autumn of 2013 brought more league titles, play-off appearances for many and a second place finish for our cheerleaders in the state M.S.S.A.A. championship.

Boys Soccer won their last three games to make the Tournament while Field Hockey fell one game short. Girls' Cross-Country had a record number of runners and ran well at the SSL Championship.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

INFRASTRUCTURE

Infrastructure Improvements Fiber Connectivity

The East Bridgewater Public School District and Town Hall improved data connectivity between the three school buildings and the Town Hall. Upgraded was the 1, 1 Giga bits per second (Gbps) fiber line with 12, 10 Gbps fiber lines. This connection allows for greater speed rates between the buildings. With this the three schools can now share an internet connection with less network hardware being needed to connect the Gordon Mitchell Middle School and the Central Elementary School to the new Jr/Sr High School. This upgrade also allows the school system to save money on server upgrades and repairs; now all servers will be housed in the Main Distribution

Frame (MDF) of the new Jr/Sr High School.

These improvements created cost saving potential, in the future, for the Town Hall. Going forward the Town Hall can take advantage of the lines to the Jr/Sr High School MDF instead of duplicating equipment in their building. **New Jr/Sr High School**

The new Jr/Sr High School building project has been completed. The new state of the art MDF is up and running. We have virtualized the majority of the servers and the storage array unit is expandable. Most of the systems in the MDF can be upgraded and expanded which will realize cost savings. The network was designed with the capabilities to house all of the town network equipment with the School District allowing for revenue savings in the future.

INSTRUCTIONAL TECHNOLOGY

Professional Development

Professional development for educators is essential for the effective classroom application of technology resources. Technology professional development was offered on in service professional days, early release days, and after school hours. Technology professional development was conducted by the director of technology, district teachers, and outside consultants.

Technology professional development was offered to all staff for the new online email system. We have moved to an on-line email system that offers greater benefits and is cost effective.

Classroom Application

Teachers are integrating technology with greater frequency for whole class instruction, student projects, and individualized support. There is expanded use of specialized assistive technology, web-based MCAS preparation programs, curriculum-related software, internet resources, streaming video, and productivity applications. Many teachers post curriculum material, homework, and information for parents on their own classroom web pages at www.ebps.net, the SchoolWires hosted website. In addition, teachers publish lessons and curriculum material to shared network drives for collaboration with colleagues. Staff and students are utilizing the Google Apps for Educations system for sharing and collaboration.

INFORMATION SERVICES

iPASS and iSTAFF Personnel Information Systems

The East Bridgewater Public School District uses iPASS and iSTAFF by Information Marketing Group of Framingham, MA for students (SIMS) (SCS), and personnel (EPIMS) data and reporting. iPASS is the database now used across the district for attendance, discipline, grade reports, transcripts, course catalogs, and scheduling. iParent is now being used in the Jr/Sr High School. iParent allows the parent to view student's progress and grades online.

The Gordon Mitchell Middle School and Central Schools are in the second year of running the Lexia program. Lexia is an online reading tool that students can access from school and home. Lexia helps students learn to read and increase academic performance. This program has an evaluation feature that will allow teachers to monitor each student's progress as well as identify areas that a student may be struggling in.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL FOOD SERVICES PROGRAM

I am pleased to submit the Annual Report of the School Food Services Program for the 2012-2013 school year.

We made the change from a self operating program in 2008 to outsourcing with a vendor in 2009 in an effort to provide a more contemporary menu, and have the professional management & marketing skills of an international company. This school year, we have contracted with Chartwells as our food service vendor for the third year of a three year contract. All of our previous food service employees were able to transfer their employment to Chartwells, and have been able to continue to work in our own schools.

We are very satisfied with the lunch prepayment system called myschoolbucks, formerly, MyNutrikids, (a registered trademark). Parents can go to our school website and follow the Food Services link and make payments online or send in a check or cash with their child and the prepayment will be done at the cash register. Parents can also look online to see what their child is purchasing for lunch. With prepayments, the lines flow much faster allowing the students more time to relax and eat. We encourage as many prepayments as possible to avoid having to hold up the line for cash transactions. At the register all students must type in their ID number, this shows the cashier how much, if any, cash is required from a student or deducts the food purchase from their account balance. This system allows privacy for those students receiving a free meal because like a prepaid account, there is no transfer of cash.

To realize excellence in education, we share a responsibility to ensure that children come to school ready to learn. Nutrition plays an integral part in that responsibility. In partnership with the United States Department of Agriculture and the Child Nutrition Programs administered by the Massachusetts Department of Education, the East Bridgewater School Food Services Program contributes to the health and well being of our students by providing nutritious and affordable meals in our schools. The program also provides low-cost meals to senior citizens at the Gordon W. Mitchell Middle School every Thursday during the school year. The price for a regular student meal including milk and a variety of side dishes is \$ 2.50 at the Central Elementary School, \$ 2.60 at the Gordon W. Mitchell Middle School and \$ 2.75 at the new Jr/Sr High School. We offer breakfast for the children in our "Before & After Care" program based in the Gordon W. Mitchell Middle School and Central Elementary School. We also offer breakfast at the Jr/Sr High School for \$ 1.50. Reduced lunches are .40 cents and reduced breakfasts are .30 cents.

The USDA had enacted the "National School Lunch Program: School Food Services Account Revenue Amendments Related to the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010" which requires an "Annual Review of Paid Lunch Revenue" to ensure that sufficient funds are provided to the nonprofit school food service account. This means that we are required to comply with and at least match the Federal meal reimbursement rates starting in the 2012-2013 school year. Based on a calculated formula provided by the USDA, we must compute the meal prices each year and adjust our lunch and breakfast prices accordingly.

We encourage all families to apply for the Free and/or Reduced meals if they meet the "Income Eligibility Guidelines" that are posted on our Food Service link of our website along with a downloadable application. Families can apply at any point during the school year, if they meet the guidelines. So if your family situation changes at any point, and you may need this benefit for your child/children, we are glad to assist you with the application.

We have menus and more information on our website. We welcome any ideas, and please call us with any questions or concerns.

Finally, thanks to Principals Gina Williams, Andrew Gentile, and Paul Vieira as well as all of the students, faculty and parents who continue to support this valuable program. And let's not forget a big thank you to our great lunch serving staff.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

It is the mission of the East Bridgewater Public School Music Department to provide all students with opportunities to explore their creative nature and develop individual talents in a positive, nurturing environment to instill a lifelong respect of the integral nature of music to the human experience.

The music department is pleased to submit the annual report for 2013.

I am pleased to introduce the following certified music educators as our teaching staff for the students of the East Bridgewater Public Schools. At the Central School, Susan Layton is in her twelfth year as a music faculty member in East Bridgewater. Sue teaches classroom music for grades Kindergarten through three from January through August. As of September 2013, Mrs. Layton is teaching grades Kindergarten through second grade. Raymond Ponte is in his eleventh year as a music teacher in East Bridgewater. From January 2013 through August 2013, Mr. Ponte taught all bands (5th grade beginner band, 6th grade band, 7th and 8th grade concert band, and the middle school jazz band) at the middle school. In addition, he teaches instrumental group lessons during the day with grades six, seven, and eight, and the 5th grade beginner lessons before school. From September 2013, Mr. Ponte teaches all instrumental lessons from grades five through eight, and the beginner band and sixth grade band. Mr. Ponte is also the instructor of the high school Jazz Band ensemble. I, Sheri Fernandes, am in my sixth year of teaching at East Bridgewater High School and as director of music. I am currently the high school band and choral director and teach the high school music electives ("History of Rock and Roll I & II" and "Music Theory I & II"). I am also the director of the co-curricular Rhythmix Jazz Chorus and Armonia Pop Chorus. Michael Coogan has completed his first year teaching full time teacher at the middle school. From January 2013 through August 2013, Mr. Coogan taught all general music classes for grades four through eight and the choruses at all grade levels from four to eight. From September 2013, Mr. Coogan teaches general music for the seventh and eighth grade, the seventh and eighth grade concert and jazz bands, and the seventh and eighth grade chorus. In addition, Mr. Coogan instructs the High School Marching Band. In September of 2013, we added Julianna Anderson to our staff at the middle school. Mrs. Anderson teaches general music for grades three through six and the choruses for grades four, five, and six.

Sheri Fernandes, Ray Ponte, and Michael Coogan all attended the annual Massachusetts Music Educators Association All-State Convention and Conference in Boston. The convention was held from February 28th through March 2nd.

The Rhythmix Jazz Chorus performed at the annual MAJE Jazz Festival held at WPI on April 24th. They had a strong performance and were awarded a bronze medal.

Susan Layton, Central School music teacher, led the entire third grade in a vocal concert held in the high school auditorium on Tuesday and Wednesday morning, April 2nd & 3rd. The concert was attended by grades one and two, as well as family members of all the performers. This was a wonderful opportunity for the performers and the audience alike. Congratulations to Mrs. Layton for this most ambitious undertaking.

The high school music department held the High School Spring Concert on Wednesday evening, April 10th at 7:00 in the high school auditorium. The program featured the hard work of all high school musical ensembles.

On May 1st, the middle school Jazz Band performed at the MAJE Southeastern Middle School Jazz Festival at Stoughton High School. The students performed beautifully and received a silver medal for their efforts.

The East Bridgewater Music Parents Association and music department held the annual "POPS" Concert at the middle school on Friday evening May 10th, and Saturday evening May 11^h 2013. These concerts featured every vocal and instrumental group in the middle school and high school from grades four through twelve. Also, to commemorate the last music department concert in the "old" high school, we invivted alumni of the music department and former music director, Daniel Lasdow, to perform. This event is one of the Music Parents Association's largest fund-raisers of the year.

The high school concert band performed at the annual East Bridgewater Memorial Day Ceremony on the Common at 10:00 AM on Monday, May 27th.

The senior recital was held on Tuesday, May 28th at 7:00PM at the high school. Senior members of the music department showcased their hard work in solos, small ensembles, and bands. Students coordinated each of their own performances for the event.

The High School Chorus performed for the Senior Awards Night on May 29th. The Concert Band also performed along with the seniors from the Chorus at the annual graduation ceremony on Sunday, June 2nd on the common.

The undergraduate student recital for students in grades 9-11 was held on Tuesday, June 4th at 7PM.

Also in late May and early June, the middle school hosted their spring concerts. On May 30th, the 4th, 5th, and 6th grade students held their concert during the day for the school and again at 7:30pm that night. On June 6th, the 7th and 8th grade students had their concert at 7:30pm. Middle school awards were presented that night.

On May 31st, the 7th and 8th grade band and chorus along with the High School Concert Band and Chorus performed at the Great East Festival. The students performed for adjudicators and received valuable feedback on their performances. Both high school ensembles and middle school ensembles received gold medals for their performances. Following the performance all of the students attended Canobie Lake Park for an afternoon of recreation and celebration.

In September, the music department started its performance schedule early in the season. Marching band, under the direction of Mr. Michael Coogan, held band camp the third week of August. After two years of rebuilding and growth, we were happy to see the group perform at various venues and festivals throughout Massachusetts during the season.

Along with the marching band, three other extracurricular music ensembles began their rehearsal and performance schedules this fall. The Rhythmix Vocal Jazz Ensemble began rehearsals in late September with Mrs. Sheri Fernandes as director. The "Armonia Pop Choir" began at this time. Also, the high school jazz band, once again under the direction of Mr. Ray Ponte began rehearsing later in the fall.

In late November, the Tri-M Music Honor Society hosted a concert featuring percussion acts. The concert was used as a fundraiser for the honor society to attend a concert in late spring of 2014.

December is always a busy month for the music department. On Wednesday evening, December 11th, the high school had their annual winter concert. The program featured the high school Concert Chorus, Rhythmix, Concert Band, Armonia Pop Chorus, and Jazz Band. This concert was the result of dedication and hard work by all of the ensembles that began in September. The concert was well received by all.

In addition, at the winter concert, Tri-M music honor society inducted several new members. The enrollment in the honor society is now 33.

On Thursday evening, December 12th, Michael Coogan hosted the annual grade 7&8 winter concert in the junior/senior high auditorium. The concert featured the grade 7&8 band and jazz band. This was the first performance of the year for most of these students and they did a great job.

On Tuesday morning, December 17th the grade four, five, and six in-school winter concerts were held. There was one performance at 9:00 AM, for all family members of performers and the entire fourth grade. Later that night they performed for their families at 7:30PM. Ray Ponte put on an impressive display of the students' hard work in these concerts.

On Thursday morning, December 19th, the high school ensembles performed a holiday concert for all of the Central school students. This is one of our favorite events of the year.

Our last event for 2013 was on Friday morning, December 20th. Members of the Tri-M Music Honor Society walked to the Central School and sang a medley of carols for students as they came off of the buses in the morning.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE CENTRAL SCHOOL

It is with great pleasure that I submit the Annual Report for 2013 as Principal of the Central School. The enrollment, as of October 1, 2013, is listed by grade level:

The Central School mission statement "to work cooperatively with the home to provide a quality education for each student, including the development of effective communication, problem solving, and decision making skills, while promoting positive self-image and respect for ourselves and others" gives us direction. The East Bridgewater educational philosophy guides us in planning for approximately 600 children in preschool through grade two. "We believe... the quality of our schools should be measured by the degree to which they successfully provide for the uniqueness of the individual learner by creating learning experiences which accommodate the

variety of learning rates, learning styles and personal needs of our students within a spectrum of public school programs."

We take great pride in the education that our staff and faculty provide for our students. The basic foundation for each child's educational success is established at the Central School. Our reading curriculum focuses on the five essential components of early literacy (phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, & comprehension). We administer the DIBELs (Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills) assessment to all students in grades k-2 throughout the year to assess their literacy level, monitor progress, and prescribe instructional methods. Again this year, through the integration of technology we have the Lexia program for all students in grades PreK-2. This web-based phonics program reinforces the skills that are being taught in school and allows students the ability to continue that practice at home. Data generated from the program assists us with decisions about programming, instruction, and materials needed in order for students to acquire the necessary literacy skills. The children receive daily math instruction through the Envision Math Program, which includes the developmentally appropriate hands on approach to learning math that the children of this age need. This program is closely aligned to the Massachusetts Frameworks as well as the National Mathematics Standards.

As we continue to build our early childhood programs, we created 4 full-day kindergarten classrooms (in addition to our traditional half day programs), 9 preschool sessions and 3 Preschool + Programs to expand the learning opportunities of our youngest population. Our full day kindergarten and preschool programs are tuition based and self-sustaining. Although we see the value in providing these opportunities to all students (tuition free) our payment program has been very successful. As we look toward the future we are hopeful that we will be able to expand these offerings to all students at no cost to the families.

All students in grades 1-2 (and full day kindergarten) receive special subject instruction five times per week. The children receive special subject instruction on a weekly basis from Mr. Justin Traut, Art Teacher, Mr. Michael McMahon, Physical Education Teacher, Mrs. Susan Layton, Music Teacher, and Mrs. Colleen Meade, Library Media Teacher. Because our health program had to be eliminated due to budgetary constraints the students rotate between the four specials throughout the week doubling up on one special each week. Now that grade three has transitioned to the Middle School (with the opening of the new Junior/Senior High School) we are now able to open up more special area blocks so that classrooms won't need to be combined during special area classes as they have been in the past.

Our School Adjustment Counselor, Mrs. Gerri Quigley, and our School Psychologist, Mrs. Sheila Pero are very involved with student placement, social and emotional development and crisis intervention situations. They are an essential component in our communication among the teachers, students, and parents to assure the success of the whole child.

We have again seen positive community support and town department cooperation in many areas. Mrs. Jennifer Lonergan is our Parent Volunteer Coordinator who organizes special events and parental involvement in our school. Mrs. LoriAnne Orofino and Mrs. Amy Foley serve as our Room Parent Coordinators under the direction of the Central School PTO. The Central School PTO has been in existence for the past 9 ½ years. The PTO has been responsible for hosting many events that bring families into the school (Family Art Night, Brockton Rox, Central School's Got Talent, Science Expo, and a variety of guest speakers). The PTO also established a link on the EBPS website. The PTO works under the direction of the executive board members Mrs. Melissa McLoud, Mrs. Jennifer Furia, Mrs. Michelle Spriggs, Mrs. Kristin Barry, Mrs. Malissa Chelmo, and Mrs. Maura Weir. The Central School Council has been very active this year with Mrs. Dawne Wolfe, Co-Chair. The Council develops our annual School Improvement Plan and analyzes policy and procedural changes to help ensure effective operations of the school. The council members are Mrs. Ann Marie Giampietro, Mrs. Tricia Eddy, Ms. Sandi Telless, Mr. Steve Blette, Mrs. Amy Rinker, Mrs. Melissa McLoud, and Mr. John Haines. As always the school is an extension of the town and it's important to have a positive working relationship with the town for the safety and well being of our children and programs. I would like to extend my sincere appreciation to all department heads for contributing to our success.

This is a very large school, which is cleaned and maintained by the Head Custodian, Mr. Larry Witnauer, and his staff, Mrs. Danielle Randall and Mr. Lou Porazzo. They have a great deal of pride in the building, which is obvious from the appearance of the school. With the addition of Mr. Brian Kiely, our Facilities Manager for the town we have been able to have a trained expert in the field to consult with on all of our maintenance and repair

projects. We have valued Brian's knowledge and commitment to the position. In the cafeteria, Mrs. Joanne Kahaiyan and Mrs. Christine Frost diligently prepare several hundred meals daily. The very competent school secretaries, Mrs. Linda McStowe, Mrs. Janine Harvey, and Mrs. Lynne McKenney are always extremely helpful and friendly to the staff, parents, and students. The school runs efficiently and effectively due to their knowledge and dedication behind the scenes.

I would like to express my sincere appreciation for the devotion and commitment of our Assistant Principal, Mrs. Catherine Byrne. She is responsible for many different tasks including student discipline, schedules, special education evaluations, and substitute teachers. Mrs. Byrne is a dedicated, intelligent and very conscientious Assistant Principal.

The central office personnel with yourself, Ms. Patricia Lugo, Business Administrator, Mr. Rob King, Technology Director, and Mrs. Marie Grable, Pupil Personnel Director, are always committed to helping us perform our daily responsibilities. The School Committee with Chairperson, Mr. George McCabe, works many hours to ensure an excellent school system for the citizens of East Bridgewater.

In closing, I have truly enjoyed the past ten years as building principal. I am excited about the changes that have occurred and look forward to many more rewarding years in the district.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE GORDON W. MITCHELL MIDDLE SCHOOL

Mission: The Mitchell Middle School, as a learning community, is dedicated to maximizing the opportunity for each student to fully challenge her/his intellectual capacity while developing social responsibility and a healthy physical and emotional well-being.

I am pleased to submit the annual report for the Gordon W. Mitchell Middle School.

STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

One of our core values is that, "learning is the central purpose of school." Student achievement is our focus and our MCAS scores suggest that we are making progress. The majority of our test scores reflect the highest level of proficiency that we have ever obtained. More importantly, our growth scores place us in the top 20% of the state. We have spent a great deal of time analyzing our scores to determine how to improve our instruction and meet the individual needs of our students. School accountability levels range from level 1 (highest achieving) to level 5 (lowest achieving). Currently, our school is ranked a Level 2 school for accountability purposes.

Curriculum: We have continued work throughout the year to align our curriculum to the Common Core, a set of national standards. This process has involved a great deal of collaboration among our staff and throughout the district to engage in the revision process. Additionally, teachers in a variety of grade levels and content areas have been evaluating the text/resources they have been using to determine whether or not they are appropriate in light of the changing standards. In grades 4-6 we have been piloting GO! Math, as math series designed around the Common Core standards. The next step in this process will be to embark on a district-wide curriculum mapping initiative, which will help to give us a global perspective of what students are learning and when.

Technology: Over the past few years our ability to bring in technology to the school, and building the staff's capacity to use it has continued to grow. We have made gains as a district this year with our ability to support the technology in the building. As a result, teachers are able to utilize these tools regularly, and students are able to experience learning in a variety of ways. Teachers have worked very hard to develop their skills and are continuing to find new and creative ways to incorporate technology into their classrooms.

Literacy Supports: This year we have been providing literacy intervention for our most struggling readers in all grades. That said, we hope to expand this type of programming next year for both 3rd and 6th grade. The results we have seen to this point have been encouraging and provide motivation to continue and expand the program. In addition to, and also in support of, the intervention groups we have been using the DIBELS reading

assessment program for all grade 3 and 4 students, as well as, targeted grade 5 & 6 students. This provides us with standardized data on our students reading ability and directs our interventions. This has been an extremely valuable investment that has paid off significantly for teachers and students.

SCHOOL COMMUNITY

In order for learning to be the central purpose of school we do a great deal to promote a climate that is conducive to learning. To this end we have adopted respect and responsibility as our other core values. The students truly embody these values in their day to day actions. There are a number of things that we have done to foster an environment that maximizes the potential of our students. Some examples include: Kool Kids, Rachel's Challenge, drama, community service projects, after-school activities.

Reorganization: We have spent a great deal of time this year as a staff and community acclimating to the new configuration of our school. Overall, the shift has been a huge success and our staff/students have settled in well. The reconfiguration allowed for us to better organize the layout of classrooms/grade levels, which has been very beneficial. We continue to evaluate ourselves as a community and will likely continue the process of defining ourselves as a school community into the future. As a district, the reorganization has provided many opportunities for us to collaborate between buildings. These have been welcome opportunities that have and will continue to help us as a district.

I am confident that our school continues to make progress. The students and staff are wonderful to work with and the community has been extremely supportive.

REPORT OF THE HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

I am pleased to submit my annual report for the year 2013 as principal of East Bridgewater Junior-Senior High School.

We had one retiree – Juan Botta. We welcomed several new members to our staff. Ann Ahnert, Language Based classroom teacher, Mathew Bailargeon, Access Learning teacher, Emily Duhamel, English teacher, Aliina Crandel, School Psychologist, Jennifer Furia, Special Education Secretary, Tom Kenney, Part-time Athletic Director, and Andrew MacDonald, Part-time Physical Education teacher. We had a successful end to the 2012-2013 school year as we moved out of the old school. We had an effective transition and start to the 2013-2014 school year as we moved into the new school. Both of these could not have happened without the support and efforts of everyone in the East Bridgewater Public Schools and the Community.

The FY '13 school year began with 994 high school students. The breakdown by grade and gender is as follows:

We have four teachers piloting a BYOD/1:1 initiative inside their classrooms. Students in these four classes will be allowed to bring in computers from home to use in class. Students that do not have a computer will be allowed

to borrow one from the school for just that specific class. The goal of the pilot is to weigh out the pros and cons of a BYOD imitative and if all works out to implement this program school wide next year.

Our March Madness activities took place during the 2nd week of March. Thank you to Mr. Siddiqui on his first and very successful planning of the March Madness activities. This is always a great week for our students and staff. The final event of the week is Mr. EBHS which is always entertaining for students, families and staff.

MCAS testing began mid-March. MCAS math, MCAS science, AP exams, and senior final exams all took place over a four-week period. It is a busy time of year for faculty and students.

The Junior Prom was held on Friday, April 5th at the Indian Pond Country Club in Kingston. The Grand March was held at 4:00 PM in the Auditorium.

The Senior Prom was held at the Canoe Club in West Bridgewater on Friday, May 17th.

The senior class was treated to an ice cream social on Monday, May 20th to celebrate winning March Madness.

Thirty-three members of the Class of 2013 received John and Abigail Adams Scholarship letters. These students scored at the *Advanced* and *Proficient* levels on their grade 10 MCAS tests in English Language Arts (ELA) and mathematics AND had a combined score that places them in the top 25% of the graduating class in the district.

Senior Awards and Scholarship night was held on Wednesday, May 29th. Many students, family members and faculty enjoyed the night. Congratulations to the students that received awards and scholarships.

Graduation was held on Sunday, June 2nd on the Town Common. It was a beautiful, sunny day and many friends and relatives enjoyed the celebration.

Google Training has been on-going for all staff members as the High School moved to Google Apps for Education on July 1, 2013. Google Suite offers fantastic educational apps to explore and ways to improve productivity for teachers and students.

In late August an email was sent to parents requesting volunteers help for the first few days of school. We needed parent volunteers to help at the start and end of the school day to assist with parking and student drop-off. We also needed to help the students navigate the new building and procedures getting from the back of the school for bus drop-off and pick-up and in the cafeteria to the classrooms. We had parent volunteers for the first 5 days of school. A brief meeting was held on Wednesday August 21st to go over what was expected of the volunteers and to set up a schedule.

Tours of the new school were given on August 20th, 21st, and 22nd at either 10:00 AM, 12:00 PM, or 6:00 PM. There were multiple tours during each session and approximately 500-700 people toured the new school. If you had a smart phone, you were able to download a QR reader for the tour.

In September 2013 we went to paperless for all of our announcements. Teachers are able to submit announcements by going to the website and click on the link to submit a morning or afternoon announcement. We are now able to cut and paste the announcements into one document and post them on the website for parents and the community to view.

The freshmen dinner was held on Thursday September 19th in the café at 7:00 PM. It was a great way to get to meet some of our new students.

I am very happy to report that I received a letter from NEASC stating that they voted unanimously to remove the school from probation.

Parent teacher conferences were held in October. I received great feedback from the parents on conference night. They were very complimentary of the school, the teachers, and the quality of education that their children receive here. It is wonderful to be able to pass these compliments on to all of my staff.

Fifty-one students were inducted into the EBJSHS National Honor Society in November. Mr. Gordon McKinnon represented the school committee to welcome and congratulate the students. Mrs. Marie Principe, EBJSHS math teacher, was the guest speaker. Students were given their certificates and pins by Principal Vieira and NHS advisor Denise Cronin. The ceremony was followed by a reception for the family and friends of the new members.

Mrs. Tucker and I worked on setting up a pilot advisory for the second half of this year. The concept was presented at the November staff faculty meeting. The schedule and curriculum was presented to staff at the December meeting. The advisory program will be implemented in January 2014.

Homecoming Spirit week is always a success. What a great idea the kids had to increase school spirit and get people excited. Both staff and students enjoyed these days. The spirit days were as follows: Monday - White Out/Clean Slate, Tuesday - Patriotic Day, Wednesday - Wacky Wednesday, Thursday - Disney/Cartoon Character Day, Friday - Blue & Gold Day. Homecoming was held on Thursday, November 28th, Thanksgiving Day.

A ribbon cutting ceremony was held on Wednesday, November 27th to dedicate the new East Bridgewater Junior - Senior High School, Anne Kenneally Hynes Library, George McCabe track, Dr. Judith Riordan Performing Arts Center and the corridor dedications named after Stanley Goldman, Michael McCarthy, Gordon Mitchell and Joseph Morey.

The Junior/Senior school administration would like to thank the police, fire, highway and town hall administrative departments for all of their cooperation and assistance throughout the year. We receive much help from the other town departments and this is very much appreciated. I would also like to thank our tireless and dedicated school committee for their support and efforts on behalf of our students. If our needs appear great, it is the consequence of years of limited budgets, societal influences and the challenges of our changing role in the technological and global environment. REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF PUPIL PERSONNEL SERVICES

As Director of Pupil Personnel Services, I am pleased to submit this Annual Report for 2013.

The Office of Pupil Personnel Services provides a myriad of support services to the children and families of the Town of East Bridgewater. Most recognizable is the range of support services provided to our children with disabilities. The district currently provides support services to approximately 470 students via either an Individualized Educational Program (IEP) or a Section 504 Accommodation Plan. In addition to providing supports to children with disabilities, the Office of Pupil Personnel Services acts as Homeless Liaison, Liaison for Home Schooling, and Liaison for services provided to our English Language Learners. The district currently supports children with various home languages such as Haitian, Creole, French, Vietnamese, Spanish, and Portuguese.

With the district-wide re-organization, the East Bridgewater Public Schools continue to expand their capacity to successfully meet the needs of diverse learners with a significant range of disabilities. The growth and success of our in-district programs has created an opportunity to receive, or tuition-in, other students from neighboring districts, thereby creating a source of revenue for the schools. An overview of our in-district K-12 programs is as follows:

Access Learning Center (ALC): The Access Learning Center is designed for students whose primary disability has been classified as intellectual, neurological, or significant developmental delay. Students receive individualized academic programming. Common Core standards are adapted to the individual needs of the students. Special education services are designed to address the individual needs of students and may include instruction in the areas of communication, social skills, functional academics, and activities of daily living. As students progress through the grades, the focus of programming transitions to vocational training, community access, and post-secondary transition planning.

As 2013 came to a close, the Access Learning Center classrooms were servicing twelve students at the elementary level, six students at the intermediate level, and nine students at the Jr. /Sr. level.

Therapeutic Learning Center (TLC): The Therapeutic Learning Center provides special education services and supports for students with social / emotional disabilities. The program is designed to provide therapeutic, academic, behavioral, and structural supports necessary for students to successfully function in the least restrictive environment. Students requiring services in this program are considered at a high risk for academic failure without appropriate behavioral, social, and emotional supports. The primary goal of this program is to help students develop and generalize coping skills in an effort to become independent learners.

As 2013 came to a close, the Therapeutic Learning Center classrooms were servicing and supporting fourteen students at the elementary level, eight students at the intermediate level, and sixteen students at the

Jr. /Sr. level.

Language Learning Center (LLC): The Language Learning Center is designed to assist students with language-based learning disabilities. A language-based learning disability is a broad term that relates to a person's ability to process reading, writing, and spelling. A person with a language-based learning disability processes information differently and needs to be taught differently. The Language Learning Center is designed to improve reading, writing, and language skills for students with significant impairments. The primary goal of the program is to improve literacy and language skills so that students can become competent readers, writers, and thinkers. Students gain an understanding of their own strengths and weaknesses, and they will be able to advocate for their individual needs.

As 2013 came to a close, the Language Learning Center classrooms were servicing nine students at the intermediate level, and eight students at the Jr. /Sr. level.

The East Bridgewater Public School District breakdown of the student population receiving special education support services, as reported at the start of the 2013-2014 school year, was as follows:

In-District Special Education Student Enrollment by Building:

Out-of-District Special Education Student Enrollment:

Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 is a national law that protects qualified individuals from discrimination based on their disability. Under this law, individuals with disabilities are defined as persons with a physical or mental impairment which substantially limits one or more major life activities. Major life activities include caring for one's self, walking, seeing, hearing, speaking, breathing, working, performing manual tasks, and learning. The total number of East Bridgewater Public School District students receiving support services via a Section 504 Accommodation plan is currently 74.

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The Special Education Parent Advisory Council (SEPAC) is a parent group that provides support, training, and networking opportunities for parents and guardians of children with disabilities. This group serves as a resource for parents, offering workshops, training opportunities, and information regarding local community resources. Workshops have been noted to include topics such as Social Skill workshop presented by Second Nature, Basic Rights workshop presented by the Federation for Children with Special Needs, Let's Get Organized workshop presented by Family Ties of Massachusetts, and Community Resources presented by the Brockton Area Arc Family Support Center. SEPAC meets regularly throughout the school year. Additional information about SEPAC, upcoming workshops, and contact information is available on the District's website.

I would like to express a personal note of thanks and appreciation to the families of East Bridgewater. Their strength and courage are inspirational and I truly appreciate the privilege of working with the families of East Bridgewater to ensure that the children of this community receive a free and appropriate education within their local home-school community.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of East Bridgewater:

The Conservation Commission meets the second and fourth Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Office Building, in the second floor Conservation Conference Room.

In 2013 the Commission held hearings for a total of 43 applications filed under the Wetlands Protection Act. Of the 43 applications 30 Notices of Intent, 7 Requests for Determination of Applicability, 2 Abbreviated Notices of Intent and 4 Amended Order of Conditions.

The new Junior/Senior High School construction project is still under construction and the commission and its staff continues to work with the project designers to make sure that the project met all the requirements of the Wetland Protection Act regulations and the Storm Water Management standards. During the project construction the site has had regular inspections made by the Commission to ensure erosion control devices were installed and maintained as designed.

The Commission would like to extend its sincere thanks to John and Joan DeLano and their staff for their continued hard work, dedication and support.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF ASSESSORS

The Board of Assessors revalues all properties in the Town in accordance with the State law requirement that property valuations must be at 100% of market value each year. The values are certified by the Massachusetts Department of Revenue (DOR) every three years, through on-site and intensive examination of the procedures and methodology being employed by the local Board of Assessors. In the intervening years, the local valuation process is the same, but State oversight consists of review and approval of required statistical analysis.

The Fiscal Year 2014 interim year certification was completed utilizing the department's Computer Aided Mass Appraisal (CAMA) system. PK Valuations performed a conversion/update of the system due to the fact that East Bridgewater was the last town to still be running the older version. Whenever there is any type of conversion, the DOR requires the town to conduct a field review of at least 50% of all properties in the town to ensure that the information populated through the conversion process is accurate. PK Valuations quoted the department a cost of \$17,000 to do this field review. In order to save money, the Assessor's office decided to conduct this review in house and completed it over a four 4 month period with more than 70% of the properties being verified, which also is considered part of the cyclical review which states that every property must be inspected at least once in every nine-year cycle.

The CAMA system is used to calculate the assessed value for each property in order to adjust to the market value as indicated by sales data. DOR issues regulations that define how the statistical sales analysis must be done. There were 117 qualified sales used in the analysis, a total from July 2011 through June 2013. A qualified sale is an open market transaction between a willing and educated buyer and seller. Types of sales not considered qualified by the DOR include those between family members or intra-corporation sales, those not exposed to the market, auction and foreclosure sales, short sales, those that involve more than one property and/or additional personal property, stressed sales (such as an estate sale, court settlement or as a result of a divorce), and where there has been a significant change after the sale before the sales analysis is done. After the analysis of land sales was completed, the land values were lowered in the town. This decreased the towns overall real property value and this was reflected in the tax rate increase. The State Department of Revenue reviewed the sales submitted and certified the values.

The Board of Assessors reports that the FY14 property tax rate was certified at \$17.37. The Department of Revenue formally notified the town of the new tax rate on December 11, 2013.

The median single-family assessment is now \$283,400. The residential tax rate is \$17.37 per thousand making the average single-family tax bill \$4923.00. The median commercial property value is \$250,200. The commercial tax rate is \$17.37 per thousand making the average commercial tax bill \$4346.00

The Board of Assessors recommended to the Board of Selectmen at the Classification Hearing held December 2, 2013 that for FY14 it vote to adopt a Uniform Tax rate, not to grant an Open Space discount, not to adopt a Residential Exemption and not to adopt a Small Commercial Exemption. The Board of Selectman voted not split the tax rate on December 2, 2013.

Our department is responsible for the valuation of just under one and a half billion dollars of real estate and personal property resulting in more than half of East Bridgewater's 45 million dollar budget. The total budget amount to be raised was \$45,566,483.69 with the tax levy or amount to be raised through property taxes of \$25,592,474.25. An additional \$1,189,779 was estimated to be raised from motor vehicle excise tax revenue.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC WORKS

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen

As the Director of Public Works for the town of East Bridgewater I am pleased to present our department's annual report for 2013. .

Highway & Land Management Division

During 2013 the Highway & Land management division oversaw several significant roadway improvement projects including; the repaving of Laurel and Pine Street, the reconstruction of 3800 feet of Elm Street, 3300 feet of Spring St., Ousamequin Pines and a section of Broad meadow Drive. Church St., Pheasant Run and Stone meadow Drive were overlaid with an aggressive surface treatment. We reconstructed over 3100 feet of sidewalk on Plymouth St. and more than 10 miles of main roads where cracked sealed as part of a town wide pavement preservation program.

Our 80 miles of roadway were swept to remove debris and roadsides were mowed 3 times during the growing season to control vegetation growth. As part of our management plan to address East Bridgewater's

storm water, our staff also cleaned over 750 catch basins, repaired 35 catch basins and cleared more than 500 feet of drainage pipe.

60 hazardous trees were removed from our road sides and an additional 25 were pruned as well as 35

stumps ground to reduce risk to the motoring public.

The very successful Adopt-an-Island program continued to grow with now most traffic islands being maintained by private companies and organizations. The renovation of Strong's field was completed with financial assistance from Little League baseball and the Recreation Commission. The DPW continued to work to improve the on-going maintenance programs for all town athletic fields and green spaces.

Water Division

The Division repaired 6 major water main breaks and 14 residential services were repaired, 7 hydrants were repaired, and 5 hydrants were replaced due to age. The division's personnel have started a hydrant upgrade program identifying hydrants that for a variety of reasons need to be replaced, also painting the hydrant and color coding to represent the main sizes for easy identification of the water main size, for the Fire Department personnel.

The water main on Spring Street, a critical section of the distribution system that has caused significant disruption over the years has been replaced in its entirety. It has been upgraded to a 12" capacity capable of providing significantly higher volume to the end user as well as increased fire protection for the area.

Division personnel have also continued with the usual ongoing programs, including cross connection surveying and testing, hydrant flushing, which must still be done to continue clearing the lines of mineral sediments that have built up over the last 100 plus years in some areas. Another critically important responsibility of the Water Division is maintaining compliance with the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection and US Environmental Protection Agency required regulatory testing ranging from daily to monthly, to quarterly, to yearly tests that test for over 300 plus possible contaminants.

Solid Waste & Recycling Division

In 2013, East Bridgewater's residents participating in our Pay As You Throw program generated and disposed of 3425 tons of solid waste. Of that "waste" nearly one third, 1205 tons of paper, plastics, tin, aluminum and cardboard were recycled.

Facilities Division

2013 marks the establishment of the Facilities Division within the DPW.

An agreement between the Board of Selectman and the School Committee has created the Facilities Division. The Facilities Division maintains all Town and School buildings owned by the town of East Bridgewater. The overall goal is to maintain and improve the quality of maintenance for all town buildings and grounds, consolidate procurement, capital planning and effective utilization of fiscal recourses. The creation and establishment of the Facilities Division has proven to be a successful endeavor.

During 2013 several Capital projects were completed, roof replacement, chiller replacement and mechanically upgrades at Town Hall. In August the new Jr. /Sr. High School opened providing a long awaited state of the art educational facility. The process of developing a comprehensive preventative maintenance plan/Capital plan has begun. The Facilities Division looks forward to the continuance of fostering relationships with all municipal departments and citizens.

Finally we want to remember Scott McCann, the town's Water Superintendent for more than 27 years. Scott's commitment to serving the department as well as East Bridgewater's residents was unprecedented. Scott personally oversaw the entire construction of East Bridgewater's water treatment facilities and systems upgrades. My appreciation for not only Scott's dedication to the DPW but his friendship will always be remembered fondly.

REPORT OF THE EAST BRIDGEWATER PATRIOTIC ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of East Bridgewater:

The purpose of the Patriotic Activities Committee (EBPAC) is to plan and provide for appropriate Town representation and participation for all activities, functions and observations of a patriotic nature. This includes planning for and preparation for; and execution of Town Parades, exercises, ceremonies and participation for events such as: Armed Forces Day, Decoration Day, Memorial Day, Flag Day, Incorporation Day, Independence Day, Veterans Day and others. In addition, the Committee's responsibilities include maintenance of and provision for all the town's Patriotic displays, including monuments, memorials, squares, flagpoles and flags.

The EBPAC continues to work with other Town committees and local civic groups and service organizations to ensure that the Town of East Bridgewater appropriately fulfills its legal and moral obligations to the People of our community, state and nation through recognition of those who have given of themselves so that our Country could remain Free and achieve greatness for the benefit of all of its Citizens.

The following are highlights, enumerating some of the accomplishments of our Committee over the past year, 2013:

On the morning of May 4th, members of the Committee took part in the reenactment in commemoration of Civil War Sergeant Harlow day, placing street flags on Plymouth Street and bunting on the buildings at Sachem Rock Farm.

On Saturday morning, May 25th, members of the Committee, together with a group of Legionnaires from Post 91 and a team of Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, plus Venturers, and their adult Leaders, marked the graves of all the Veterans in all town cemeteries with new American Flags, fulfilling the historical obligation of Decoration Day, the original precursor to Memorial Day.

At 11:00 a.m. on Monday, May 27th the Committee, in conjunction with the Commercial Club and American Legion Post 91 hosted the 145th Memorial Day commemoration; the 30th held on our Town Common. After an Invocation by Rev. Donald Olson, Pastor of Community Covenant Church, we sadly noted the passing of twenty-one military Veterans from among our town residents: seven from World War II, seven from the Korean War and five from the Vietnam war, plus two peacetime veterans, over the past year. Moving and respectful Exercises on the Common included music provided by the East Bridgewater High School Concert Band, the recitation of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address by student Nicholas Gagnon, and the haunting notes of "Taps" by buglers Tristen Fuller and Zachary Connolly, Gregory Carroll and Nicholas Grondin, student musicians at East Bridgewater High School. An American Legion honor guard rendered rifle salutes at each of the Veterans' memorial Monuments down flag-lined Central Street, and the people then adjourned to the Commercial Club where, after a brief ceremony hosted by president Donald Arena at the Peter Moskos memorial pavilion, a fine family style chicken barbecue provided by EBCC members was heartily enjoyed by all of those in attendance.

On the evening of June 9th on the Town Common, the Committee helped coordinate a Flag Day observation ceremony conducted by American Legion Post 91 with Cub Scouts from Pack 28, Boy Scouts from Troops 29 and 32, and Venturers from Crew 29, assisted by local musician Ted Haines. Included in the commemoration of Old Glory was the American Legion ceremony, the bugle call "To The Colors" and the appropriately solemn ceremonial destruction and disposal by fire of many old, faded, tattered and worn American Flags that had been removed from the town cemeteries and/or contributed by town departments and patriotic local and area Citzens, a fair number of whom were in attendance to witness the event.

On Monday, November 11th the Committee, together with American Legion Post 91, organized the 95th annual commemoration of Veterans Day. The traditional Tri Town Veterans Day Parade and Exercises were hosted this year in the town of West Bridgewater. The theme was "Honoring All, Yesterday and Today". On a cool but clear, and pleasant day, our contingent of marching units, as well as our Veterans, Selectmen, Police officers and Firefighters once again represented us proudly, The parade route began at our staging area Brewster Road, left onto North Elm St, down West Center, thence to North Main St. to the Town Hall. Mrs. Debra Cowan served as parade Judge for our town. The Judges' Choice trophy was won by the Young Marines of Plymouth, the Best Theme/Float trophy was won by Cub Scout Pack 23 of West Bridgewater, and the Best Marching Unit trophy was won by the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 2125 color guard of Bridgewater. The commemorative exercises took

place on the Town Bandstand, in a cool breeze; and after the Invocation was offered by Rev William Smith of Temple Baptist Church, the speakers were relatively brief and their words both heartfelt and evocative, and the services were appropriately solemn and patriotic. A welcome Collation of sandwiches and a variety of desserts was served by a committee of local volunteers in the function hall of St. Ann's catholic Church.

Again this year the Committee managed, on its small budget and with a good amount of Volunteer help and a few donations, to maintain the Town's Flags (at Rowena Hobart park, at the Town Hall, on the Common and at the old Town Cemetery), and the Memorials, (the four dedicated Squares and the Bridge), refurbish our wreaths and make needed repairs to some of the Veterans monuments, including the timely replacement of all the Town Flags as they became faded, damaged or destroyed by the effects of our hot and cold, rainy and blustery and always unpredictable New England weather.

Our sincere thanks go to Superintendent of Schools Susan Cote; High School Principal Paul Vieira, the Custodial Maintenance department's John Roback; Music Department head Sherri Fernandes, and the East Bridgewater High School Band. Also, thanks go to our Veterans Services Officer Robert Charles, members of the Tree Department, the Park Department, the DPW, the Police Department and the Fire Department; the Selectmen and Cathy Johnson and the Town Administrator; also Mrs. Joyce Francis and all the town officials, Departments, other Committees and volunteers who helped out and worked with us throughout the year.

Thanks also to Mr. John Brooks, the Service Organizations of East Bridgewater, and the Citizens of our Town, without whom we could not have achieved the successes of the past year. We look forward to working with and for all of you again throughout 2014, when the town of Bridgewater will host the Tri-Town Veterans Day Parade, Exercises and Collation on Tuesday, November 11th.

We cannot let this opportunity pass without once again soliciting for a few good Citizens to join with us in the important work of providing for Patriotic observances and the maintenance of our patriotic monuments and memorials and our Veterans' graves in East Bridgewater during our 191st year. We note that there are many vacancies on the Committee, and we would be happy to hear from any other resident Citizens who may be interested in doing this important work. The year 2014 will be the last for both the chair and vice chair of this committee, as it is time to move on, and hopefully a new group of dedicated, civic minded individuals will keep the traditions going for many years to come. Your letter of interest, delivered to the Selectmen's Office, will be acted upon promptly and forwarded to us. Our Town needs your help, our Veterans and Patriots deserve your attention and remembrance, and our cause continues to require our best collective efforts. Thank you.

REPORT OF THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLANNING COMMITTEE

In Fiscal '07 the Capital Committee began developing a strategic plan in its approach with the capital needs of the community. The first step was for voters to approve the implementation of a <u>Capital Stabilization Fund</u> at the ballot box. The second tier consisted of considering immediate projects, while developing a long range plan to maintain the infrastructure of the Town.

Due to the continued conservative budgeting of the town, the Capital Stabilization Fund has been funded with the free cash that has been available which has allowed the fund to grow and to provide a steady funding source for capital projects. The Capital Planning Committee is now ready to formulate a viable long term capital plan that can be funded from the Capital Stabilization Fund.

Over the past several years, the Capital Planning Committee has supported the long range Road Improvement Plan that the DPW Director has developed and the paving projects recommended for approval in FY2013 reflects this support.

For fiscal year 2014 the Capital Committee met with all department heads who had submitted capital requests. The following projects were approved to be voted by the town body at its annual meeting:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

To the Citizens of the Town of East Bridgewater:

The Board of Selectmen are pleased to report on their actions and accomplishments during the year 2013.

The Board welcomed David Sheedy as a new member.

Construction of the new Community Center at Sachem Rock was completed and the center was opened to the public. In addition to becoming the new home of the Council on Aging, this project provided for the restoration and revitalization of an historic town owned property. The building and the grounds are to be available to residents to serve as a location for a variety of community events.

Construction of the new East Bridgewater Junior/Senior High School building was completed and the school was opened in time for the 2013/2014 school year. The new building will house Grades 7-12 and free up space in the Middle and Central Schools. This marked the largest public works project in the town's history. Construction of the grounds is scheduled to be completed in mid-2014.

The joint venture between the Town of East Bridgewater and Sage Stone Solar came to fruition in 2013. An installation with 10,000 solar panels was constructed on a remote town owned property without any capital outlay by the Town. At 2.45 megawatts of generation capacity, it is among the largest solar installations in Massachusetts. The solar panels are expected to produce more than 3 million kilowatt hours of electricity per year and significantly reduce energy costs for the Town through net metering credits.

Recognizing the need to improve the quality of maintenance of all Town and School facilities, the Board of Selectmen and the School Committee signed an agreement to consolidate town-wide maintenance efforts in a Facilities Maintenance Department within the Department of Public Works. East Bridgewater resident Brian Kiely was hired to be the first Facilities Manager. The intent of this agreement is to provide for flexibility of staff in buildings and grounds maintenance to enhance the overall condition of all public buildings and grounds.

In an effort to control escalating costs and provide more health care choices for employees, the Board and the town's employees negotiated an agreement to move from the Southeastern Mass Health Group (SMHG) and join thousands of state and municipal employees in the Group Insurance Commission (GIC). Based on the GIC's recent history, the move is expected to stabilize increases in the short term and provide thousands of dollars in first year savings.

Town Administrator George Samia reported that the Town continues to maintain an excellent bond rating from Moody's Investor Services that belies the fiscal difficulties that all towns of the Commonwealth are enduring. The highly favorable rate of Aa3 is a most notable achievement by Mr.Samia and the entire financial team.

The Board wishes to thank Town Administrator George Samia, Administrative Assistant Cathy Johnson, and Senior Clerk Gloria Mitchell for their assistance and cooperation throughout the year.

The Board of Selectmen are grateful to all town boards, committees and departments for their continued cooperation and efforts, and extends a heartfelt thank you for all your hard work and dedication to the Town of East Bridgewater.
